Synopsis: ROBERT ROYCE AUGG, Lancaster, Ohio, advised he knew OSWALD for three or four months during latter part 1957 or early part 1958 while both were in USMC assigned to Japan. OSWALD kept to himself most of time and no one knew much about him. AUGG last saw OSWALD when OSWALD was lying on bunk while medical corpsman tied tourniquet around arm to stop flow of blood from bullet wound self-inflicted accidentally.

DETAILS:

MILITARY SERVICE

Mr. ROBERT ROYCE AUGG, Recreation Leader, Boys Industrial School, Lancaster, Ohio, who resides at 623 Pine Street, Lancaster, Ohio, advised on March 11, 1964, that he was associated with LEE HARVEY OSWALD for about three or four months during the latter part of 1957 or the early part of 1958. At that time they were both assigned to the U. S. Marine Corps Air Control Squadron Number 1, Group 11, Atsuki, Japan. OSWALD had the bunk above him in the barracks. AUGG described OSWALD as an individual who kept to himself and who would not associate with other Marines when they went on liberty. OSWALD read considerably and spent much of his off duty time at the library.

AUGG did not know the type or titles of any of the books that OSWALD read. When on liberty OSWALD would go off by himself and he had no idea of OSWALD's activities while on liberty. OSWALD did not give any indication of being a Marxist or Communist. AUGG stated that about the only thing that he ascertained from OSWALD, during conversation with him, was the impression that OSWALD's mother was wealthy, however, he later found out she was actually on relief.

OSWALD always appeared to have money, and AUGG had the impression that this money came from his mother.

The last time he saw OSWALD was one day he returned to their quarters and saw OSWALD on his bunk while a medical corpsman tied a plastic tourniquet around OSWALD's arm. OSWALD had accidentally shot himself with a .22 caliber Derringer pistol. OSWALD was taken to the hospital and AUGG understood that OSWALD was later given a court-martial where he was charged with failure to register the above .22 caliber Derringer.

AUGG said that the only classified information that he knew that OSWALD possessed was information concerning the Identification Friend-or Foe (IFF) System which he believed to now have been declassified due to perfection of newer and better systems.

AUGG stated that during the time that he knew OSWALD in Japan, they did not have the occasion to do any firing on the range, and therefore, he possesses no information concerning OSWALD's marksmanship with firearms.
