I called the Attorney Goneral at his home and advised him of the newsland announcing that the Freeident and Governor Connally of Texas had been shot in Lialias, today, while touring Dallas in an open car, and that the first news liash indicated the shot was believed to be fatal. The Attorney General had not previously been advised of this.

I asked the Attorney General If there was anything we could " do at Unites. He asked that we do whatever we could, and I told him we would get in touch with the Secret Service there.

SAC Shanklin called from Pallas. Mr. Shanklin advised that the only information the Lelias Ullice had was from the radio. According to the radio in Dallas, the fresident and the Governor were shot at the corner of Elm and Consucrce Streets in a motor parade going out to the place where they were to areak. One witness said a Negro man leaned out a window and made two shots, and the police have the whole building surrounded. The Fresident and the Governor had been taken to Farkland flospital and the President was bleeding from the head.

I instructed BAC Shanklin to get in touch with the Secret Service and offer aesistance. Hir. Shanklin stated he had already done so. Jaleo told hir. Shanklin to establish licteon with the local police. ---

I impulsed as to the Governor's condition and Mr. Shankling ladicated they had not reported on this. I inquired about the Vice President and Mr. Shanklin said the Vice President was in the parade but in a different car. 

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SAC Shanklin called again and stated the President was in very poor condition but not dead. He said they had called in two priests. 

hir. Shanklin related that the shots came from the fourth floor. He stated the Dallag Office is unligitatining Halson and has offered a supplied. assistance. They do not know whether the shots were fixed by a white whole person or a colored person. The lirst story was that a colored man leaned out of a window but they do not know; they are searching the whole bullding. 

Mr. Shouklin advised that the Governor had been taken to an emergency operating room and the Fresident was in the general entergency room. The last report was that the Fresident was in very, very critical condition but was still alive.

Mr. Shanklin inquired li the Altorney General or anyone whom they should meet would be coming to Dallas. I advised hir. Shanklin I would let him know II the Attorney General decided to travel to Pallas.

Mr. Shanklin advised he had just received word the Fresident was shot with a Winchester sills.

I called the Attorney General to advise him that the President. was in very, very critical condition. The Attorney General then told me the President had died.

I advised the Attorney General that the Governor was in very serious condition; that here. Kennedy was not burt and neither was Mrs. Councily.

I told the Attorney General that the shot came from the fourth floor of a building and the building was completely surrounded now. I

Surther advised him the President was shot by a Winchester sifle. I stated the Dallas Office is working in every way to help the Secret Fervice and local police.
