The real "old pros" are so seldom with us any more, I was thinking the other day in Baltimore when I watched John Wayne going through measured, drawly paces on the waterfront. Well, he was shooting some last scenes from Sam Bronston's "Circus World."

Duke Wayne'll be mid-50, easy, but he has taken fair care of himself and he's still big boned. He hasn't improved on the technique any more than Uible, or Deger, or big Comp Johnson, on the solid self-casting that made them great. The "old pros" keep right on doing it right, like Y. A. Title throws passes, bats head or not.

There was a lady with me to study Wayne. Her name is Eva Monty, and her last three films as a production manager were "Exodus," "Lawrence of Arabia," and the recent "The Cardinal," which everybody's so excited about. Eva doesn't stand knee-high to a jam-jar, and she's quite young despite the gray in her hair, put there by actors and directors. She only goes as far back in films as "King Solomon's Mines," but she's an "old pro," too.

It gives you a great sense of contrast to mingle with the professionals. It reminds you of watching Joe DiMaggio after a long fly ball, or Mr. Lawrence Berra coming up to bat at the clinic.

Wayne's presence, and Eva's visit, brought me back to Adolpho Menjou, who left us the other week. There was the substantial professional. He spoke eight languages fluently, and was twice an American on the late Bob Burns. He dressed like the duchess of dudes, and used short words like a swordsman. From the look of him, he might have been a Communist from sunny Paris, and in actuality he was the blackest Republican this side of Barry Goldwater.

A lot of people won't remember that Deigh played the leathery old city editor ever written, the prototype of the faded Walter Henry in Charlie MacArthur's "Front Page." He could and did play a Communist, if necessary—and always he played the same villainous when he was actually as friendly as a puppy.
