At 3:45 p.m., 11/23/63, an individual giving his name as Walter Britchie, Boston, Massachusetts, and who described his occupation as that of a traveling salesman, called long distance from Boston to express concern over the danger of having all of the country's leaders at one place together at the late President Kennedy's funeral. Mr. Britchie said that he had no specific information that anything was going to happen, but said that he did not trust communists and recalled that a sneak attack by the Japanese at Pearl Harbor had happened and he thought that a similar attack could happen again. He pointed out that according to the press, all of our top Government executives, members of Congress, all of the top military leaders and the governors of all of the states could be present in one place. He said that he did not think this should be allowed to happen.

Mr. Britchie stated that this was entirely within the newsstand. He had no information or reason to suspect that anything would happen along the line mentioned. He was thanked for his interest in calling.
