Dear Mr. McCray.

Assassination of President Kennedy.

I was deeply shocked by the news of the assassination of the President of the United States and I hope you will not consider it too presumptuous on my part to express my opinion, on the facts so far published in the local English press.

When it was stated that the assassin used a telescopic rifle I had no doubt that it was not a work of a madman but a specially trained executioner. When it was announced that Oswald admitted being a communist and before the further investigation could have taken place he was shot by Rubinstein I have no doubt in my mind that:

1. The assassination was organised by Soviet secret service's department "Smerch", and further

2. That there is a network of such executioners in the U.S.A.

The speed with which the execution of Oswald was carried out has convinced of the Soviet work and also the existence of the network in your country.

I am not an intelligence man but since, as an advocate, I was consulted on the Soviet espionage cases in England I have come to this opinion and I feel it my duty, as a friend of United States to communicate this opinion to you. I only know you in the Embassy this I am writing to you.

This is only an opinion which U.S.A. authorities may take into a consideration in their investigation if they so wish.

My wife and son join me in expressing our heartfelt sympathy at so tragic loss of your Great President.
