


To Atsuyuki Sassa, Japanese police security agent, who worked with the FBI during the investigation of the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

## July. 17, 1964

Dear Mr. Sassa:
I am sorry you don't understand the questions raised concerning the investigation of the assassination of our President.

In regard to the three bursts of gunfire, it is not the 5.5 or the 6.6 seconds which are significant, but rather the time-sequence BETHEEN the second and third bursts which is of vital importance. If you recall from testimony, it is this time-sequence which preciudes the possibility that the second and third bursts of gunfire originated from the 6.5 mm bolt-action, single-shot Italian carbine. The Farren Commission, itself, is in a quandry in this regard (Allen \& Scott) as well they should be.
There are other points, other issues, in this case too detailed for examination here. Once the Warren report is in, they will be attended. In the meantime, we suggest you not put too much faith in the American FBI. The FBI has manipulated evidence and intimidated witnesses before (unfortunately, we have proof in this regard), and, unless stopped, it will do it again.
