MISCELLANEOUS - INFORMATION CONCERNING

At 8:30 p.m., September 15, 1964, [redacted] Chicago, Illinois, advised the Chicago Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation that entertainer Dick Gregory held a press conference at 3:00 p.m. that date at the Essex Inn Motel, Chicago, to promote the sale of a book entitled, "Vigor," which he authored. During the press conference, according to [redacted] Gregory also discussed the assassination of President John F. Kennedy. He was critical of the United States Government and, in particular, the Federal Bureau of Investigation, stating he believed that certain photographs of Lee Harvey Oswald which had been released by the Government are fake because of certain shadows which appear on them.

Gregory also talked, according to [redacted] about the murder of three civil rights workers in Mississippi during the past summer and stated that both he and the Federal Bureau of Investigation know who killed the workers but that as yet the Bureau has made no arrests. He was critical of the Federal Bureau of Investigation for failure to answer certain questions concerning that investigation which need to be answered.

At 10:30 p.m., September 15, 1964, the above information was furnished to Officer John Campbell, Chicago Police Department.
