RE: ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT
JOHN FITZGERALD KENNEDY,
NOVEMBER 22, 1963, DALLAS, TEXAS;
MISCELLANEOUS - INFORMATION CONCERNING

On October 24, 1964, the following information was telephonically received from a person who identified himself as [redacted] residence address - [redacted] and business address - [redacted]

[redacted] is of the opinion that the assassination of President John F. Kennedy was arranged by then Vice-President Lyndon B. Johnson. Dr. Agee stated that he realized that he might be "crazy" in having such an opinion but that he arrived at this conclusion after much thought about the matter. He stated his knowledge about the assassination of President Kennedy was based solely on information appearing in newspapers, and the report of the Warren Commission. His conclusion is only conjecture, based on Agee's belief that President Johnson, when Vice-President, had motive, means, power and character to arrange for the assassination.

[redacted] further stated that he does not believe the Warren Commission went far enough into investigating the death of President Kennedy. He did not think Chief Justice Warren was qualified to head the investigation of Kennedy's assassination; that instead Director John E. Hoover was better qualified to direct such an investigation. He stated further that in his opinion former Attorney General Robert Kennedy is aware of President Johnson's connection with the assassination and that if President Johnson does not die within the next two years of a coronary that Robert Kennedy will take some action to dispose of President Johnson.
