Referenced airtels concern information furnished by Melvin L. Gray, Jr., relating to a .303 Savage bullet found at the assassination site in Dallas and results of an interview with Gray by the Houston Division.

Referenced Dallas airtel dated 2/21/68 indicated Mr. and Mrs. Melvin L. Gray and Melvin L. Gray, Jr., did not want their names divulged or that the information they furnished be disclosed outside the FBI. However, due to : the nature of the information they furnished, this must be disseminated to other Government agencies.

Houston determine if Melvin L. Gray, Jr., still desires his identity be concealed. If he does, handle accordingly, and incorporate the results of his interview in an LHM. If he has no objection to revealing his identity, then it should be set forth in the LHM. Noting his apparent cooperation and the fact he considered furt nishing this information to District Attorney James Garrison in New Orleans, it would appear that he would not object to having his identity revealed.
