After the arrest of David William Ferrie on Friday, August 25, 1961, he was suspended by his employers, Eastern Airlines.

The account of his arrest in the August 26th edition of the New Orleans Time-Picayune said: "The 43-year-old airline pilot apparently used alcohol, hypnotism, and the adventure of flying to lure the juveniles—mostly 15 and 16-year-olds—into committing indecent acts.

Officers said Ferrie, as well as being an airline pilot, was a former Civil Air Patrol squadron commander.

After he was quietly dismissed from the New Orleans C. A. P. Wing about a year ago, he formed his own unit, the Metairie Falcon Squadron.

Ferrie is listed in the telephone book as "Dr." and officers said they understand he is a doctor of philosophy.

New Orleans Police Officers working with Jefferson Parish Sheriff's authorities obtained a search warrant and went through Ferrie's home earlier this week.

They discovered seven or eight World War I type rifles with a quantity of ammunition. Many maps of Cuba were also found in Ferrie's home, police added.

Therefore, it is easy to see the reason for much of the misinformation picked up by the newspaper people during those early days of the investigation. OVERTHROW CENTRAL AMERICAN PRES.

This witness' name appears many times in early news releases of the Frobe, but not in the Warren Report.

(Editor's Note: This stolen ammunition was supposed to have been given by the C. I. A. to the Cubans trying to overthrow Castro. They were double crossed. Instead, the C. I. A. gave this ammunition to a group in a Central American republic to overthrow its president, at whom the C. I. A. became mad. The Cubans failed in the Bay of Pigs fiasco. This Central American president was overthrown with this stolen ammunition and the help of the C. I. A. The C. I. A. has also contributed money in Louisiana political campaigns. Have they also contributed money in presidential elections?)

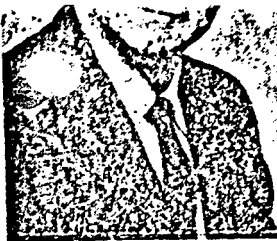

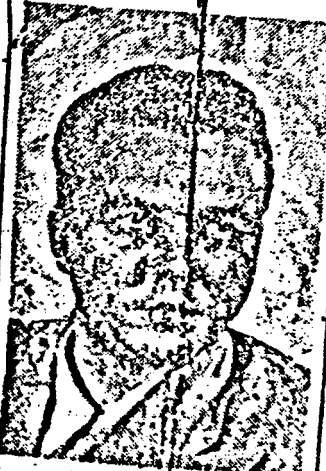

qualified officer but didn't have a chance.

So the voting public decided to vote for the best qualified man who didn't have a chance, and enough people decided to vote for the man who didn't have a chance that Kern missed having a clear majority by 2730 votes over the two supposedly strong candidates.

In the runoff election Kern defeated Woolley 64,299 votes to 25,589.

Kern's second campaign was in 1950. That was the era of Dale Richardson, the bat swinging constable of LaPorte.

Richardson had a large following and was backed by practically all the preachers. He was looked upon as a honest and honorable peace officer and the Nemesis of gamblers.

THE HOUSTONIAN exposed him as a crook who was only shaking the gamblers down and breaking up the places of those who wouldn't pay him his excessive prices.

THE HOUSTONIAN started a grand jury investigation on Richardson. The mayor of LaPorte stopped it. THE HOUSTONIAN started another grand jury investigation which reprimanded Richardson. Nat Terence, editor of THE HOUSTONIAN had Richardson indicted by a federal grand jury and the trial which followed was a most sensational one.

When we started our expose on Dale Richardson, most people didn't believe us and thought we were persecuting a knight in white armor. The windup was that we proved 100 per cent everything we ever said about that crook who later did time in the penitentiary.

The results of that campaign: Kern 64,530; Richardson 15,534 and a character named Marvin Lake 2,637. Kern's majority over his two opponents was 46,128 votes.

In 1952 another constable wanted to be sheriff. This time it was Constable Bill Lambert of Precinct 2. Another candidate was Charles Nix who resigned as a captain in the sheriff's dept.

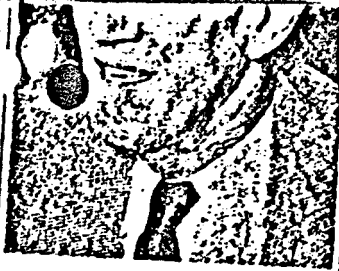
The results: Kern 82,646; Lambert 27,246, and Nix 10,069. Kern's majority over his two opponents was 45,331 votes.

After Lambert was so badly defeated he still wanted to be sheriff. He was crazy enough to think that if he had Kern bumped off he would be appointed sheriff by commissioner's court. He also wanted Terence bumped off so he wouldn't be an obstacle to Lambert getting the appointment.

An attempt was made to kill Kern by putting a bomb in his car. Young, who was chief deputy under Lambert, was killed trying to commit a holdup. Before Young was killed he made arrangements with G. Clinton Greenwood to kill Terence.

Kern again had opposition in 1954 in Marvin Lake. Like a vulture, Lake was going around collecting campaign contributions on a long shot. He was telling people that if anything happened to Kern after the deadline for candidates, he'd be the sole candidate and get the office by default.

In 1964 Charlie Nix again ran against Kern and was defeated 115,321 votes to 24,292.

So in eight elections Kern received a total of 663,861 votes, or an average of 82,983 votes each election.

In those elections the 10 opponents Kern had received a total of 193,315 votes, an average of 19,332 votes.

Kern's total was 470,546 votes more than the total of all his opponents or a majority of 63,651 in each campaign.

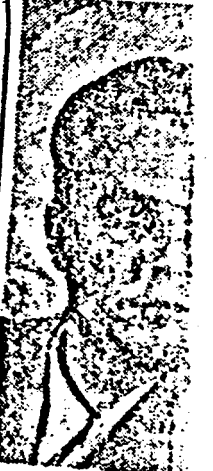
