500,000 Value Placed on Oswald Paraphernalia

Mrs. Marina Oswald Porter's advisers suggested she have certain paraphernalia belonging to the late Lee Harvey Oswald at \$500,000, a document filed this week in federal court.

The document — a 17-page deposition taken Jan. 31 — in the case of Asst. U.S. Atty. Ken Shell — became one of a

growing number of legal papers dealing with the suit Mrs. Porter filed against the U.S. government in October.

The remarried widow of the man the Warren Commission named as President Kennedy's assassin, she wants the money as compensation for several hundred items confiscated by

the government for the National Archives.

In the deposition, however, she acknowledged she met John J. King, a Denver gun collector, about an hour in Dallas several months ago to discuss the suit she then intended to file.

But she added she and King did not sign any agreement leading her to bring the \$500,000 suit.

King is similarly seeking \$3 million compensation from the government for the rifle used to kill the president and a pistol used to kill Dallas policeman J. D. Tippitt. He had purchased both from Mrs. Porter.
