Dear Senator Jackson,

In view of our discussion of the Kennedy assassination in full hearings last April with Paul Friedlander, I am enclosing the information you requested concerning the details of Oswald's possible relationship with some American intelligence agency. What I have included is by no means complete, but is rather the basic evidence which demonstrates that a new investigation is surely needed.

I might also say that Attorney-General Levy has scheduled a meeting for July 10 with Prof. Richard Popkin of George Washington University in St. Louis. Prof. Popkin has substantial documentation that U.S. intelligence agencies were connected with the assassination, but the FBI had knowledge of the plot and made no effort to stop it, and, further, that the identity of the actual killer is known. Popkin has two sources totally independent of one another: one a former British man in Dealey Plaza and the other a former Agent. The latter is currently seeking immunity before the Church Committee. Prof. Popkin has already made known to the public that he has this information in his possession, but is disclosing none of the names of the individuals involved until his meeting with the Attorney-General.

I hope the implications of a conspiracy and cover-up in the death of President Kennedy disturb you as they do myself and many other citizens. At this point in time, I believe the only sure way out of getting at the whole truth is the congressional power of subpoena. I hope the enclosed information will be of service to that end.
