MISCELLANEOUS INFORMATION RE
RICHARD SIDNEY WATSON

On April 21, 1977, [redacted] was interviewed at his office, [redacted]. On that date, [redacted] indicated that he has been receiving correspondence from [redacted] since the middle of 1976. When he first started receiving letters, they appeared to be written by an individual who may have concrete information concerning crimes committed in the United States and elsewhere in the world. However, [redacted] later determined that in his opinion, [redacted] and that subsequent correspondence appeared to have no basis in fact. [redacted] stated that in addition to the correspondence, he received numerous phone calls from [redacted] at which time [redacted] was [redacted].

[redacted] could not understand how [redacted] was able to make the phone calls because they were numerous and lengthy. During each phone call [redacted] attempted to convince [redacted] that he had been working for the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) and the Drug Enforcement Administration and had been sent by these two agencies to Mexico to help with undercover investigations in that country. However, when [redacted] checked with these two Government agencies in California, both agencies indicated they were aware of [redacted] and considered him an individual who was [redacted].

[redacted] also indicated that he had received telephone calls from [redacted] the noted correspondent [redacted] Attorney [redacted] and other individuals asking about [redacted] stated that in each case, the individual told him that [redacted] indicated in correspondence with these individuals that he had given [redacted] bomb shell information concerning undercover operations of the CIA infiltration of Government by foreign agents" and other information that was checked out as unreliable. [redacted] stated that when [redacted] would call him, he would appear to [redacted] but then would start to ramble on numerous subjects.

[redacted] advised that [redacted] had sent him at least 1,500 pages of rambling bits of information containing all types of allegations unfounded. In addition, the margins of the paper would have unrelated information scribbled on them along with small pictures drawn by [redacted] that appeared to make no sense.

b7c [redacted] also stated that he has contacted [redacted] numerous occasions concerning [redacted] and it is his opinion that [redacted] also thinks that Watson [redacted]

[redacted] advised that he did not notice any information in [redacted] correspondence concerning Lee Harvey Oswald or Jack Ruby that was substantial and does not recall [redacted] mentioning any film showing Oswald and Fidel Castro.
