Texas B 7-17-41 IN Russia

The Bureau is in receipt of a letter addressed to Mrs. Lee H. Oswald, care of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Washington, D. C. This letter is post-marked Toronto, Ontario, 7:30 P.M., 11-27-63, and bears the return address of the "Sun Life Assurance Company of Canada," 200 University Avenue, Toronto 1, Ontario. This envelope also bears the notation "Please Forward."

A highly confidential source advised on 11-22-63 this envelope contained two blank sheets of paper approximately 3" by 4" in size folded in half, which acted as cover sheets to a similar size piece of paper with indented writing and a \$10 Canadian note with a paper clip. Preliminary examination of indented writing does not indicate anything of significance and should anything of value be developed this source will again be contacted and you will be advised accordingly. No active investigation is indicated or being requested at this time.

Dallas is instructed to forward the letter to Mrs. Oswald, and obtain an appropriate receipt for same, provided you are in possession of no information which would preclude such delivery, and advise the Bureau of results.

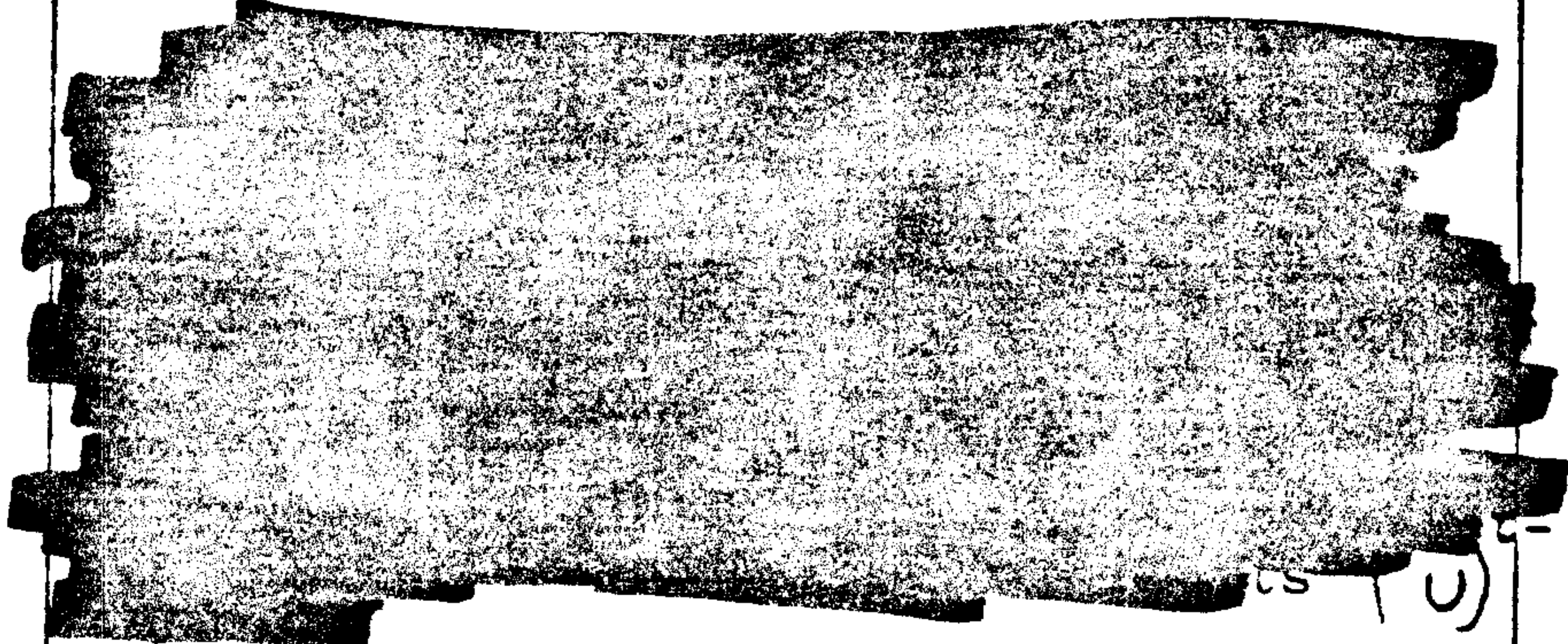

NEW YORK — The Right Rev. James A. Pike, controversial Episcopal bishop, and Edward M. Keating, publisher of *Commentary* Magazine, declared yesterday that they believed the assassination of President Kennedy was a "conspiracy" in which Lee Harvey Oswald played only a part.

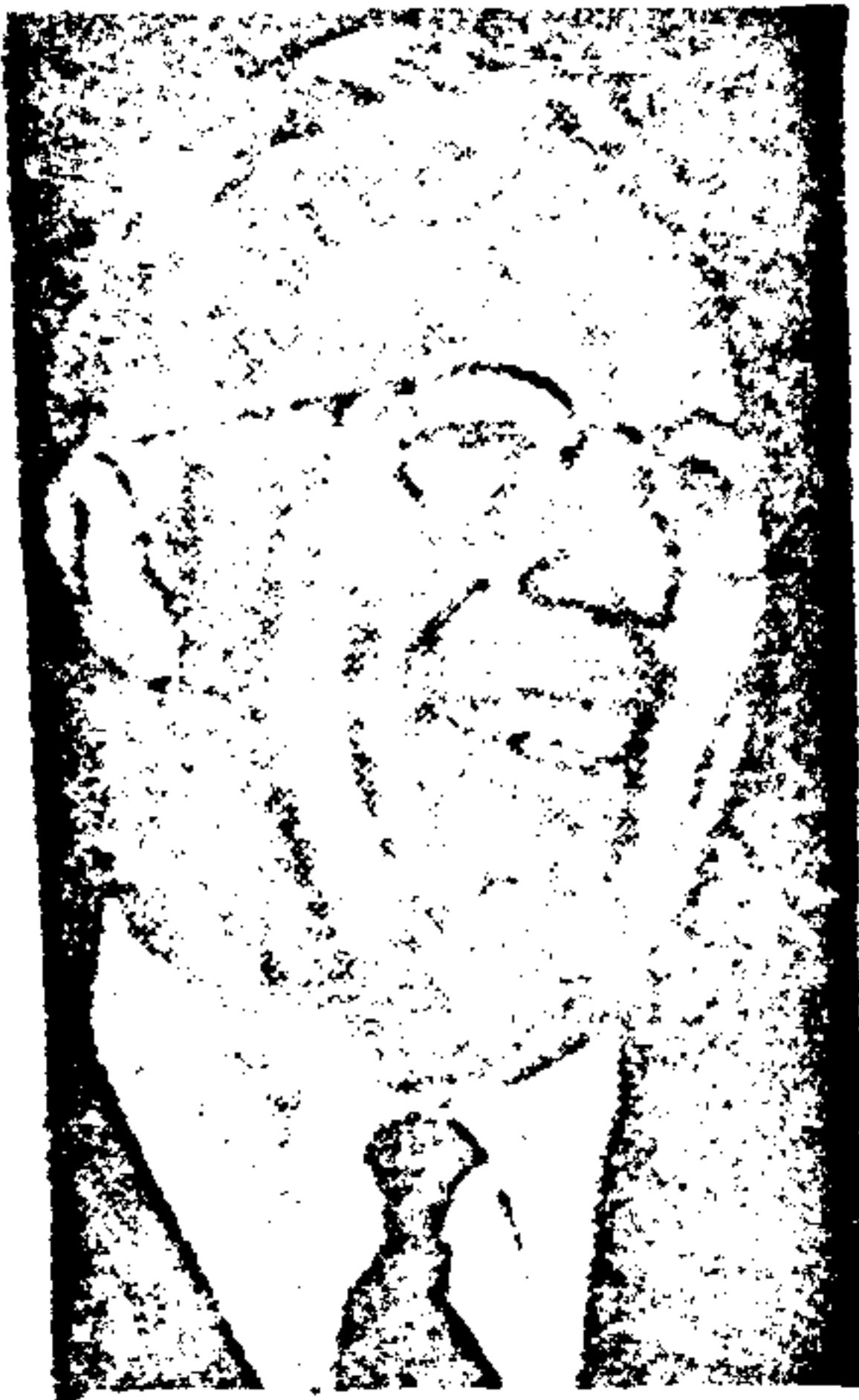
The two men held a news conference at Kennedy International Airport here yesterday to announce the formation of an interfaith committee to call on President Johnson to release withheld information about the assassination. They said a petition would be submitted to the President within 10 days. Both said that despite their belief in a conspiracy, they would accept the Warren Commission verdict that Oswald was acting alone, if "suppressed" information established that fact. Pike said that at this time there is a "high degree of non-acceptance" in the U.S. of the Warren Commission conclusions.

Bishop Pike, who is under investigation by an Episcopal Church committee for possible heresy charges, declared that "the most important thing in the long run is the truth," and that even if "our image abroad" suffers, the facts should be known.

Keating's San Francisco-based magazine is running articles in its current issue about violent deaths of 10 persons who could have been linked in the assassination. He said 90 per cent of evidence gathered by the CIA and 50 per cent of that gathered by the FBI has not been released. However, he suggested that the "most critical suppressed evidence" is a color movie of the assassination taken by a Dallas amateur photographer and the 40 autopsy photographs and X-rays of Kennedy's body.

Both men disputed Chief Justice Earl Warren's contention that further facts should be released because of "national security."

"Warren Isn't God," Pike said. "Let us judge about national security. I have one vote, you have one vote, and Justice Warren has one vote. Let's have the truth."
