TODAY [REDACTED] HOLLADAY, UTAH, ADVISED THAT ABOUT OCTOBER TWENTYTHREE INSTANT, HE WAS TALKING TO JOE KAVIHIA /PHONETIC/ WHO OPERATES JOE-S STAND, SIX ZERO FOUR FIVE SOUTH STATE STREET, MURRAY, UTAH. JOE HAD A PRINTED LIST OF PRESIDENTS WITH THE DATES OF THEIR DEATHS AND SAID THAT PRESIDENTS MC KINLEY AND LINCOLN WERE ASSASSINATED. HE SAID THAT PRESIDENT KENNEDY WOULD ALSO BE ASSASSINATED, THAT HE WOULD NOT LIVE TO HAVE A SECOND TERM AND THAT HE WOULD NOT GIVE A DIME FOR HIS LIFE RIGHT NOW.

[REDACTED] HAS TALKED WITH JOE THREE OR FOUR TIMES DURING THE PAST YEAR AND JOE HAS SPOKEN IN FAVOR OF CASTRO AND HIS FORM OF DICTATORSHIP. HE HAS SAID THAT THE UNITED STATES IS PUSHING OTHER COUNTRIES AROUND, THAT THE U. S. GOVERNMENT IS NOT

SUBJECT: FUNERAL OF PRESIDENT KENNEDY
NOVEMBER 25, 1963

At 1:30 A.M., midnight Supervisor William E. Assmus received a telephone call from Daniel Dockery 32 Varnum Street, Washington, D. C. in which Mr. Dockery expressed his fear that the line of persons waiting to view the President's coffin in the Capitol might erupt into violence.

Mr. Dockery stated that at the time of his call the line was approximately 40 blocks long and consisted of a mixed group of colored and white persons, particularly nearer the end of the line. Dockery stated vicious remarks were being passed between the groups and apparently some of the individuals had been drinking and tension was very very obvious. Dockery stated it would be a sad reflection on this country if a racial riot should break out in Washington under the present circumstances. Dockery stated he had advised the Metropolitan Police Department but felt they had paid little attention to his information and he requested that the FBI do whatever they could to ease the situation. Dockery was informed the policing of the crowd was the responsibility of the Metropolitan Police Department, but that they would be alerted to the nature of the information furnished by him.

At 1:46 A.M. Sergeant W. Patterson of the Metropolitan Police Department was telephonically furnished the above information and he stated he would see that this was passed along to the officers at the scene.

SUBJECT: Arrangements for the arrival of the remains of the late President of the United States John F. Kennedy; including Period of Repose; Lying in State at the United States Capitol and the Funeral Procession from the United States Capitol to St. Matthews Cathedral - November 24 - 25, 1963.

TO THE FORCE:

The remains of the late President of the United States, John F. Kennedy is in repose in the East Room of the White House and will remain at that location until 1:00 p.m., Sunday, November 24, 1963, at which time a Funeral Procession will move from the White House to the United States Capitol, where there will be a Period of Repose and Lying in State.

At 11:00 a.m., Monday, November 25, 1963, the remains of the late President of the United States will be removed from the Rotunda of the United States Capitol and there will be a Funeral Procession from the United States Capitol to the White House where it will pause for a few moments in order to allow the family and close friends to join this Procession. The Funeral Procession will then continue on to St. Matthews Cathedral.

1. SCHEDULE OF EVENTS (Approximate):

- A. 1:00 p.m. -- The remains of the late President John F. Kennedy leaves the White House.
- B. 1:50 p.m. -- The remains of the late President of the United States arrives at the United States Capitol.
- C. 2:30 p.m. -- The remains of the late President of the United States will Lie in State until 10:00 a.m., Monday, November 25, 1963.

Monday, November 25, 1963

- A. 10:30 a.m. -- The remains of the late President of the United States will be removed from the place of Lying in State and a Funeral Procession will be held.
- B. 11:00 a.m. -- The Funeral Procession leaves the United States Capitol and proceeds to the White House where there will be a brief pause while the family and close friends join the Funeral Procession. The Procession will move to St. Matthews Cathedral.

2. RESPONSIBILITY OF THE METROPOLITAN POLICE:

The Metropolitan Police will be responsible for the handling of traffic and crowds along the route of the Funeral Procession and in areas adjacent thereto.

- A. Chief of Police Robert V. Murray will personally direct all arrangements and details.
- B. Deputy Chief Howard V. Covell shall have general supervision over all police arrangements and details necessary to carry out the provisions of this order.
- C. Deputy Chief Loraine T. Johnson shall be in charge of all police arrangements and details in the Capitol Plaza and Section 9.
- D. Deputy Chief George R. Wallrodt shall be in command of the First Division of the Funeral Procession Route, comprised of Section 1.
- E. Deputy Chief Thomas Rasmusen shall be in command of the Second Division of the Funeral Procession Route, comprised of Sections 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6.
- F. Deputy Chief Henry H. Heflin shall be in command of the Third Division of the Funeral Procession Route, comprised of Sections 7 and 8.
- G. Deputy Chief Albert L. Embrey shall be in command of the detail at St. Matthews Cathedral, comprised of Section 10.
- H. Deputy Chief William J. Liverman shall command and maintain all traffic control in connection with all funeral arrangements.
- I. Deputy Chief John B. Layton shall provide the plainclothes detail necessary for the protection of the public insofar as the Detective Division activities are concerned.
- J. Deputy Chief Roy E. Blick shall continue regular assignment, Morals Division.
- K. Inspector Otto P. Fuss shall be in charge of all police arrangements and details along the Funeral Procession Route, from the west curb of 15th Street to the west curb of 17th Street.
- L. Acting Inspector John F. Ryan shall be in charge of all police arrangements and details along the Funeral Procession Route, from the east curb of 12th Street to the west curb of 15th Street at New York Avenue.

2. RESPONSIBILITY OF THE METROPOLITAN POLICE (Continued):

- M. Inspector William T. Murphy shall be in charge of all police arrangements and details along the Funeral Procession Route, from the east curb of 6th Street to the east curb of 12th Street.
- N. Inspector George E. Causey shall be in charge of all police arrangements and details along the Procession Route from Delaware Avenue to the east curb of 6th Street.
- O. Inspector John S. Hughes shall be in charge of all police arrangements and details along the Funeral Procession Route from the north curb of H Street and 17th Street to the east curb of 17th Street and Rhode Island Avenue.
- P. Inspector Charles L. Wright shall assist Deputy Chief Liverman and supervise traffic control north and west of the Funeral Procession Route.
- Q. Inspector Richard J. Felber shall continue regular assignment, Detective Division.
- R. Inspector Nunzio Bonaccorsy shall continue regular assignment, Detective Division.
- S. Inspector Lawrence A. Hartnett shall continue regular assignment, Detective Division.
- T. Inspector Howard F. Mowry shall assist Deputy Chief Loraine T. Johnson in supervising the details on the Capitol Plaza and Section 9.

Out the northeast gate onto Pennsylvania Avenue to 15th Street, N.W.;

Southeast on Pennsylvania Avenue to Constitution Avenue;
East on Constitution Avenue to Delaware Avenue, N.E.,
across the United States Capitol Plaza to the east front of the United States Capitol where the remains of the late President of the United States, John F. Kennedy will be removed from the caisson, carried into the Rotunda of the United States Capitol to lie in State.

North on 15th Street to Pennsylvania Avenue;

West on Pennsylvania Avenue where the caisson will

Southbound: Bladensburg Road to Maryland Avenue, N. E.; Maryland Avenue to Stanton Park; around Stanton Park and south on 4th Street, N. E. and S. E. to North Carolina Avenue, S. E.; southwest on North Carolina Avenue to D Street, S. E.; west on D Street to Canal Street; Canal Street to C Street, S. W.; west on C to the South West Freeway.

4. PHOTOGRAPHERS, REPORTERS, ETC.

Press photographers, reporters, newsreel cameramen, etc., shall be permitted to operate along the Funeral Procession Route. The news media have pooled their services on this occasion and will join the parade as a part thereof. Press passes other than these would be restricted in the immediate vicinity of the parade.

Members of this Department should understand that a holder of a Press Pass has been recognized by the Commissioners' Committee on the Issuance and Use of Press Passes as being a person whose occupation requires him or her to work within or through the established police lines, and should cooperate fully, rendering every reasonable assistance so as to expedite his or her movements within or through the established police lines, in accordance with this order. Cooperation with accredited representatives of all news-gathering organizations is extremely important in promoting good public relations. A cooperative attitude and a courteous explanation, where necessary, will usually result in a more favorable presentation of the facts from the police viewpoint.

5. COURTESY:

It is realized that members of the Department may work many long and arduous hours of extra duty on this solemn occasion. With this view in mind, the factors of patience, courtesy, tolerance, and consideration are brought to your attention.

Members of the Force, in handling the many unusual circumstances that arise, shall be patient, discreet, and solicitous of the citizens of our own city, as well as the multitude of visitors. Courtesy and consideration of the public, as well as between ourselves and members of other departments assisting us, is of the utmost importance.

Innumerable questions will be asked and information sought from members of the Department. Every reasonable effort shall be made to furnish the information requested and, if found necessary, the inquirer shall be directed to the proper source where the information may be obtained. Many minor infractions of our regulations will be committed, particularly on the part of visitors, and should be explained to the violators.

We should all bear in mind the fact that visitors and others coming in contact with the police frequently judge the entire Department by the actions of one officer. The visitors will be from all sections of our country and the courtesy and assistance rendered by members of this Department will cause them to take back home a lasting and favorable impression of their visit to the Nation's Capital.

6. SECURITY:

As members of the Metropolitan Police Department you have been assigned this most important and solemn duty. The eyes of the world and our nation will be focused upon the Funeral Procession for the late President of the United States, John F. Kennedy. Each of us who are privileged to participate must do so in a dignified manner and shall take into consideration the deep emotional feelings of the people, some who came great distances to pay their last respects to our deceased President.

We must have patience, and tact in the handling of such people upon this most solemn and important occasion. We must conduct ourselves in a dignified manner and be ever vigilant in the performance of our duty to the end that every member of the Metropolitan Police Department is alert at all times, so as to afford security to all persons who are participating in the Funeral Procession.

7. MOTORCYCLE ESCORTS AND SPECIAL DETAILS:

The Traffic Division shall furnish the necessary motorcycle escorts and details to carry out the provisions of this order.

8. UNIFORM:

The uniform on this occasion shall be the regulation uniform of the day, unless otherwise directed. No white gloves. No batons.

9. GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS:

Section Commanders shall alternately assign police members of their commands along the route to face the center of the street and others facing the crowds at the curb. A sufficient number of police officers shall be assigned facing the center of the street for security. This does not mean that every other man shall be so assigned, but only such number deemed to be necessary for security. At least every fourth man should be facing the Funeral Procession. Section Commanders shall take over personal supervision at the most important intersection along the route that lies within their respective Section and remain there during the entire period of the passing of the procession, unless an emergency exists at some other point within their respective Section along the route of the procession or by personal direction of a superior.

Salutes to the Colors shall be given by the Commanding Officer of the Section.

Officials and members of the Force assigned along the route of the Funeral Procession shall not salute officials passing over the route. However, they shall comply with Section 9, Article III, Manual of the Metropolitan Police Department, when addressed by or reporting to a superior officer.

Section Commanders shall not relieve their details until directed to do so by the Inspectors commanding their Divisions, and shall prevent encroachment on the rear of the procession for at least five blocks after it passes.

Members of the Metropolitan Police Department Band will not be used as a musical unit on this occasion and will be available for use on other details.

The Deputy Chiefs, Inspectors and Captains on this detail shall submit reports to the Chief of Police concerning the adequateness of preparations made for this occasion, particularly stressing the number of personnel necessary to handle same. Such reports shall include any recommendations for future similar events. Section Commanders, in submitting their reports, shall channel them through the Inspector supervising their Section. These reports shall be forwarded within five (5) days after November 25, 1963.

At 11:07 p.m., 11/22/63, Mr. Adam Yarmolinsky, the Special Assistant to the Secretary of Defense, telephonically furnished the identity of certain defectors during the Korean War. Mr. Yarmolinsky said he had an idea that possibly the following individuals, who had a similar background to Lee Harvey Oswald, might have been in Dallas on November 22, 1963, and might possibly be involved in the assassination of the President. He furnished the names of Libero Picciardelli, Robert E. Webster, and Nicholas Petrulli as the Korean War defectors he had in mind.

Mr. Yarmolinsky was thanked for bringing this matter to our attention, and was advised the matter would receive appropriate attention.

We are checking further on this.

Bureau files contain no information concerning Libero Picciardelli, however, both Webster and Petrulli are the subjects of Bureau cases. Neither were defectors in the Korean War, but both were defectors to Russia in 1959.

Webster was born on 10/23/28, Tiffin, Ohio, and served as an enlisted man in the U. S. Navy from 8/5/47 to 5/17/50, and received an honorable discharge. In October, 1959, Webster, while employed by the Rand Development Corporation at the U. S. Exhibition in Moscow, renounced his American Citizenship. He returned to the U. S. on 5/20/62. Subsequent to his return, he was interviewed by Bureau Agents, by the Secret Service and appeared before the Senate Subcommittee to Investigate the Administration of the Internal Security Act. At the time of his return, he was residing at 311 East Beaver Street, Zelienople, Pennsylvania, with his parents. The latest information available in Bureau files showed an employment in May, 1963, with the Wesco Manufacturing Company, 2000 Main Street, Wellsville, Ohio, and a residence in the In-City Motel, Main Street, Wellsville, Ohio.

According to Bureau files, Petrulli renounced his U. S. Citizenship while in Moscow as a tourist on 9/3/59. He returned to the U. S. on 9/22/59. At this time he was residing with his brother, Dominick Petrulli, 354 N. Central Avenue, Valley Stream, Long Island. Bureau files reveal that Petrulli's ex-wife was living in Los Angeles. There was no information in Bureau files of either Webster or Petrulli indicating any connection with Oswald, although Oswald was in Russia at approximately the same time as Webster.

ACTION:

The Cleveland and New York Divisions have been instructed to discreetly ascertain the whereabouts of Webster and Petrulli on 11/22/63.

I called Mr. James J. Rowley, Chief of the Secret Service, to offer our assistance. I advised Mr. Rowley that our Dallas Office was already in contact with the Secret Service in Dallas and that we would render every possible assistance.

I mentioned that one of the Secret Service agents reportedly had been killed, and he stated he did not know this. I told him I had asked the name of the Secret Service Agent killed but it was not known.

I told Mr. Rowley that apparently the shooting came from the fourth floor of a building and shells had been found in the building; that these were Winchester shells - apparently a Winchester rifle was used; and that the building was surrounded.

Mr. Rowley stated he was also thinking of subversive elements - Mexico and Cuba. I then mentioned the Klan element. I advised Mr. Rowley that one witness stated he saw a Negro man lean out a window but later this was not confirmed and they do not know whether it was a white or a black.

I told Mr. Rowley the Bureau would render every assistance. Mr. Rowley indicated our assistance would be welcome and thanked me.

Assistant Attorney General Norbert A. Schlei, Office of Legal Counsel, called. He stated he was drafting various forms of a proclamation for use by the new President and wondered if I could tell him whether I had any knowledge as to what kind of people murdered the President. He indicated the form of the proclamation might depend on whether these were madmen, disappointed office seekers, representing some political point of view, were segregationist madmen, or just who they were.

I told Mr. Schlei I thought very probably we had in custody the man who killed the President in Dallas but this had not definitely been established. I advised Mr. Schlei that Lee Harvey Oswald spent some years in Russia, although he was born in America; that he tried unsuccessfully to renounce his American citizenship; and then came back here. I stated our interest in Oswald came about from the fact that he had been associated with the Fair Play for Cuba Committee; that he was arrested in New Orleans some months ago for handing out leaflets in behalf of that committee. I told Mr. Schlei that Oswald was working in the building from which the shots were fired; that we have the rifle and 3 empty shells found in the building in which the man was employed. I said Oswald apparently left this building and a block or two away two police officers moved toward him, and for no good reason - he opened fire on them and killed one. I told Mr. Schlei that the police have Oswald in custody and we are interrogating him at the present time. I stated he would be in the category of a nut and the extremist pro-Castro crowd.

President Truman was by Puerto Ricans in the Nationalist Party, which was the same group who opened fire in the House of Representatives from the gallery.

Concerning the assassination of President McKinley, I advised Mr. Schiel that Czolgosz, who killed President McKinley, was a student of Emma Goldman and that I later prosecuted her for deportation from the United States. I said we did not catch up with Emma Goldman until 1919, when we rounded up a group of anarchists and sent them back to Russia. I related that Czolgosz attended meetings at Goldman's home in Chicago, where she had a meeting place for people with anarchist views. I stated that Goldman was a well educated woman - self educated - coming from the sweatshops of the New York garment district; that she wrote on many subjects and wrote well.

I advised Mr. Schiel that almost all assassins had some imaginary grievance, usually of a political type - of either the anarchist viewpoint or the communist viewpoint. I stated the communists did not come into the picture until 1917.

I said Oswald, if he were the man, would be in the category of being an extreme radical of the left; that he was a member of the Fair Play for Cuba Committee; that several of the leaders of this group have been indicted; but that this man never was a leader. I stated he was born an American but tried unsuccessfully to lose his American citizenship; came back to this country in 1962; made several trips to Cuba; upon his return each time we questioned him about what he went to Cuba for and he answered that it was none of our business. I said his working in this particular building where he was employed would lend credence to the fact that he may very likely be the man.

I advised Mr. Schiel that we have been getting leads from all over the country. I stated in California there is a story which has some substance which we are running down that a man made a statement to some woman at Long Beach that the President would be assassinated in Dallas today.

I also advised Mr. Schiel that Western Union has brought to our attention telegrams containing veiled threats to the President in the past several days.

I told him in criminal cases there are always four or five people who turn up who claim to be guilty. I stated I would think Oswald would

be the one. I stated our Agents view him as a nut as he freezes up and withdraws into himself when he is being questioned as he did this afternoon down in Dallas. I said that much depends upon the evidence to be obtained; that the rifle has been handled by dozens of people probably - the building was filled with people watching the parade; by the time they got to the fifth floor, the rifle had been dropped and thrown over into a corner; there was indication he was eating fried chicken sandwiches this afternoon; we have to check this out and find where he obtained the chicken.

I stated Oswald is the principal suspect in the case; we are trying to persuade him to submit to a polygraph examination; and as soon as the body arrives in Washington, we will determine whether the bullets have been taken out because we will need that in the trial of the case to tie in with the empty shells found by the gun. I informed Mr. Echiel that at the hospital in Dallas they were not certain the bullets had been taken out; that the body is going to be removed to the Bethesda Naval Hospital and, if the bullets are still in the body, they will be removed.

Mr. Echiel stated I had been very helpful and he appreciated it very much. I told him, if we can be of any further help, to call on me.

I called the Attorney General at his home and advised him of the newflash announcing that the President and Governor Connally of Texas had been shot in Dallas, today, while touring Dallas in an open car, and that the first newflash indicated the shot was believed to be fatal. The Attorney General had not previously been advised of this.

I asked the Attorney General if there was anything we could do at Dallas. He asked that we do whatever we could, and I told him we would get in touch with the Secret Service there.

1:48 p.m.

SAC Shanklin called from Dallas. Mr. Shanklin advised that the only information the Dallas Office had was from the radio. According to the radio in Dallas, the President and the Governor were shot at the corner of Elm and Commerce Streets in a motor parade going out to the place where they were to speak. One witness said a Negro man leaned out a window and made two shots, and the police have the whole building surrounded. The President and the Governor had been taken to Parkland Hospital and the President was bleeding from the head.

I instructed SAC Shanklin to get in touch with the Secret Service and offer assistance. Mr. Shanklin stated he had already done so. I also told Mr. Shanklin to establish liaison with the local police.

I inquired as to the Governor's condition and Mr. Shanklin indicated they had not reported on this. I inquired about the Vice President and Mr. Shanklin said the Vice President was in the parade but in a different car.

2:07 p.m.

SAC Shanklin called again and stated the President was in very poor condition but not dead. He said they had called in two priests.

Mr. Shanklin related that the shots came from the fourth floor. He stated the Dallas Office is maintaining liaison and has offered assistance. They do not know whether the shots were fired by a white person or a colored person. The first story was that a colored man leaned out of a window but they do not know; they are searching the whole building.

Mr. Shanklin advised that the Governor had been taken to an emergency operating room and the President was in the general emergency room. The last report was that the President was in very, very critical condition but was still alive.

Mr. Shanklin inquired if the Attorney General or anyone whom they should meet would be coming to Dallas. I advised Mr. Shanklin I would let him know if the Attorney General decided to travel to Dallas.

Mr. Shanklin advised he had just received word the President was shot with a Winchester rifle.

2:10 p.m.

I called the Attorney General to advise him that the President was in very, very critical condition. The Attorney General then told me the President had died.

I advised the Attorney General that the Governor was in very serious condition; that Mrs. Kennedy was not hurt and neither was Mrs. Connally.

I told the Attorney General that the shot came from the fourth floor of a building and the building was completely surrounded now. I further advised him the President was shot by a Winchester rifle. I stated the Dallas Office is working in every way to help the Secret Service and local police.

I inquired if the Attorney General intended to go to Dallas and he stated he did not know exactly what he would do. I told him, if he decided to go down, to let me know and our office would meet him.

2:17 p.m.

SAC Shanklin called and advised that the doctor had just told our Agents that President Kennedy had just died. They said this was not being put out yet.

I instructed Mr. Shanklin to go all out on this and find out who did it.

Mr. Shanklin stated they had located 3 or 4 shells in the building and the Sheriff's Office had picked up one man.

I told Mr. Shanklin to give every assistance we can there and do everything we possibly can there at the building.

Mr. Shanklin stated that a Secret Service agent had also been killed. He stated they did not mention that at first but an Agent at the Police Department advised that one died. He did not know the name of this Secret Service agent.

Mr. Shanklin mentioned that he was supposed to come in Monday and he would cancel that. I advised him I thought he should cancel this.

I told Mr. Shanklin that the Attorney General did not know what he was going to do, that he may or may not go to Dallas, but I would let Mr. Shanklin know if the Attorney General decided to go to Dallas.

I called the Attorney General at his home and told him I thought we had the man who killed the President down in Dallas at the present time. I stated the man's name is Lee Harvey Oswald; that he was working in the building from which the shots were fired that hit the President and the Governor; that apparently he left the building and a block or two away ran into two police officers and, thinking they were going to arrest him, shot at them and killed one of them with a side arm; that the rifle had been left in the building.

I told the Attorney General that we have had a case on Oswald as he has been involved in the Fair Play for Cuba Committee. I stated the Dallas police have him down at headquarters and I have our Agents there.

The Attorney General asked if Oswald is a communist. I said that he is not a communist but has communist leanings. I related that Oswald went to Russia and stayed three years; came back to the United States in June, 1962, and went to Cuba on several occasions but would not tell us what he went to Cuba for. I stated he is a very mean-minded individual; that it is entirely possible he may have some communist sympathies but, so far as we know, is not a member of the Communist Party.

I told the Attorney General that, since the Secret Service is tied up, I thought we should move into the case.

I advised him that I have told our men to go down to police headquarters and participate in the interrogation of Oswald.

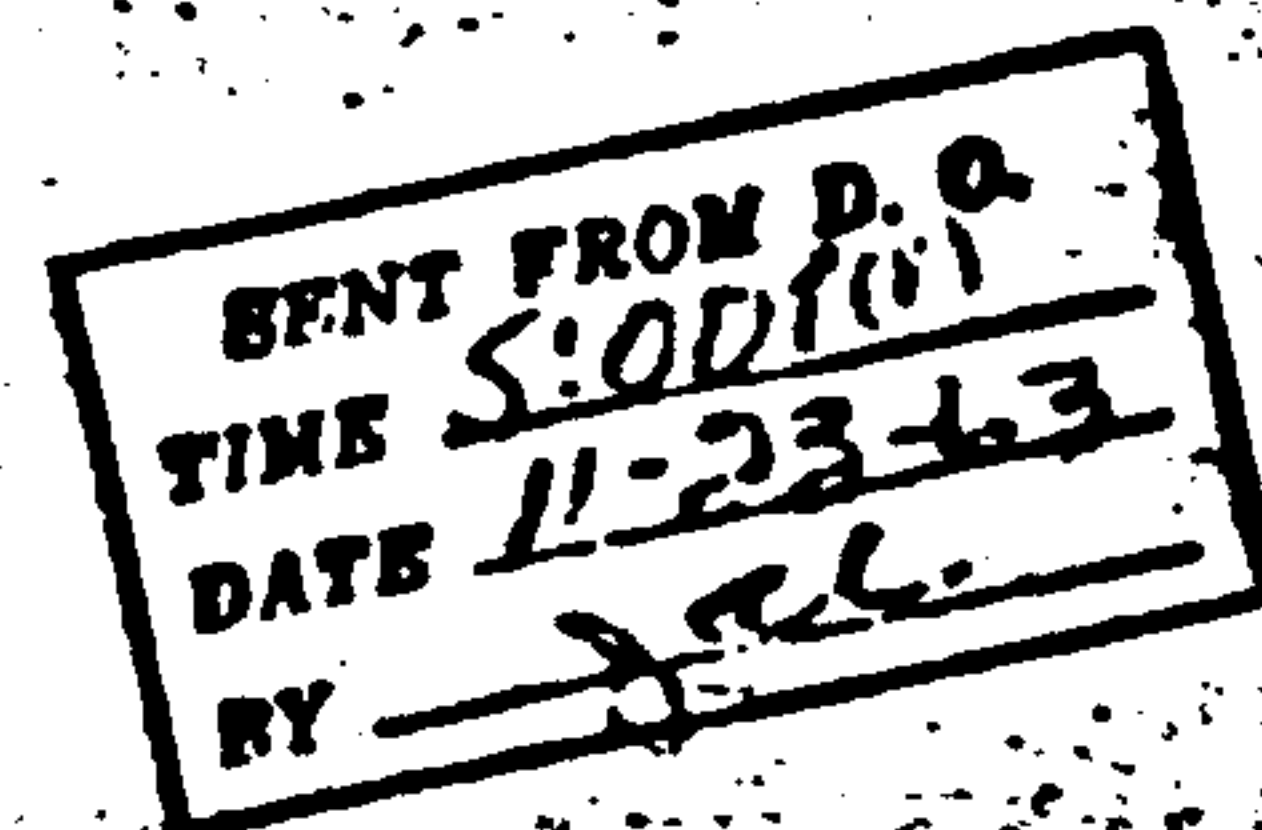
I also advised him that we have received information that a woman notified police authorities at Long Beach that she was told a few days ago that the President would be killed in Dallas by some man friend of hers, when he arrived in Dallas today. I stated we are trying to find this woman and locate the man friend.

I advised him also that a telephone operator at the Woodner overheard a conversation with a man in Texas in which the Washington man inquired whether or not it had been carried out and the man here said: "I will remain quiet then." I said we reported this to the Secret Service and they have sent agents out to the Woodner Apartments.

Re telephonic conversation between Assistant Director BELMONT and Inspector J. R. MALLEY, Dallas, 11/25/63.

For the information of the Laboratory on November 25, 1963, Dr. JACK G. HARPER, Methodist Hospital, Dallas, Texas, telephonically advised that his nephew WILLIAM ALLEN HARPER, a student at Texas Christian University, but who lives in Dallas at 2378 East Ledbetter Street, was taking photographs during the afternoon of 11/23/63, approximately 5:30 PM near the area just south of the spot where President KENNEDY was assassinated and had found a piece of bone. The bone piece was located approximately 25 feet south of the spot where President KENNEDY was shot. Dr. HARPER stated that his nephew immediately brought the bone to him and he and the Chief Pathologist at Methodist Hospital, Dr. C. E. KERNS, had examined the piece of bone and both definitely feel that it is a piece of human skull. Dr. HARPER felt that in view of the proximity of the place where the piece of bone was located it might possible be part of President KENNEDY's skull.

Inspector MALLEY was instructed by Assistant Director BELMONT to immediately forward this bone material to the FBI Lab for examination.

SA JAMES W. ANDERTON of the Dallas Office, who personally received the bone piece from WILLIAM ALLEN HARVEY, immediately contacted Mr. J. L. KELLEY, Secret Service, Dallas, who immediately contacted the President's physician at the White House and was told that the bone piece should be eventually delivered to Mr. BOUCK, Chief, Protective Research Section, Secret Service, The White House, so that in the event this bone piece is from President KENNEDY's head it can be enclosed in the autopsy reports.

Dr. HARPER as well as WILLIAM ALLEN HARPER were told that no publicity should be given whatsoever. Dr. HARPER felt that this bone piece was possibly from the back of the head.

The Laboratory is requested to conduct an examination of this piece of bone to ascertain if it is from the human skull and to have it delivered as soon as possible to Mr. BOUCK, Chief, Protective Research Section, Secret Service, The White House.

I called Mr. Walter Jenkins at the White House and advised him that we had killed the editorial in the Post. I said the matter had been discussed with Mr. Friendly, the managing editor.

I further advised Mr. Jenkins that Mr. Friendly had said it had been discussed; that they did not think the report ought to be released by the Attorney General or anyone in the Department of Justice; that it should be released either by the President or some distinguished jurist who would review it.

Mr. Jenkins asked what I thought of this, and I said I thought we ought to see how the report shapes up; as it looked at the moment, I thought it probably would be better to have it released by the President; that yesterday the President felt it should be kept in the Department of Justice; but from the attitude of Friendly, his feeling is that in the country there is so much feeling against the Attorney General it might not be accepted as the complete and true picture notwithstanding the fact the investigation was made by the FBI. I said, in view of the Post's position which they naturally would have, it seemed to me the reports we will submit will have all the exhibits and could very readily be made available to the press by either the Attorney General or the President.

Mr. Jenkins said he presumed the report will be pretty conclusive; almost speak for itself. I said it would; that the main one on the assassination we can probably have ready within the next twenty-four hours but I
