Investigation in this matter has been predicated on information supplied by JAMES R. ELLIS, 9622 Forestridge, Dallas 38, Texas, on March 9, 1964, concerning his sighting of subject vehicle occupied by a lone youth weaving in and out of the traffic at 70 miles an hour on the Central Expressway shortly following the assassination of President KENNEDY. Mr. ELLIS had recalled the license on this vehicle as Oklahoma 37-1963. Previous investigation reported has concerned current registrations; that which follows relates to a 1962 Oklahoma registration No. 37-1963, a 1953 Chevrolet, two-door, VIN B53K060123, to J. P. MORROW, Jr., Post Office Box 201, Disney, Oklahoma.

Date July 7, 1964

Mrs. JESSE PLEDGER MORROW, Jr., Box 201, Disney, Oklahoma, advised her husband is employed by the O'Brien Chicken Plant, Jay, Oklahoma as a Routeman. She said her husband is the registered owner of a 1953 dark green over cream Chevrolet, two-door, VIN B53K060123, bearing 1964 Oklahoma license CG-1324. She exhibited original Oklahoma title No. E 220504 A which verified the ownership of this car since July 17, 1956. The 1962 license was recorded as 37-1963. The 1963 license was ME-0780.

Mrs. MORROW advised her son LARRY JOE MORROW, age 19, now drives the car and has since his graduation from high school in May, 1963. She stated her son has never been out of the State of Oklahoma with the car including Texas. She said neither she nor her husband have been in Texas with this car since they have owned it and none of their license plates have ever been stolen. She did not know what disposition was made of the 1962 license when the 1963 license was purchased.

Re: DAVID MOREY WASS, JR.

At approximately 11:00 P.M., June 2, 1964, an individual identifying himself as DAVID WASS, Apartment 208A, 4010 Swiss Street, Dallas, Texas, telephonically advised Night Clerk L. JOSEPH HERSLEY that he had a matter which he did not desire to discuss over the telephone. This individual stated that, in brief, he had made contact with the "Syndicate", and that a member of the "Syndicate" had been talking to him regarding the assassination of President JOHN FITZGERALD KENNEDY. This individual stated that the member of the "Syndicate" had stated that the President's brother was the one who was supposed to have been killed.

The individual stated that he worked at the Dental Arts Laboratory, Suite 206, Dorchester House, Dallas, Texas, and that he desired an Agent contact him as soon as possible at that location as he did not desire to discuss the matter further on the telephone. This individual stated that he was to be recontacted, either on Wednesday or Thursday evening, June 3 or 4, 1964, by the "Syndicate" member and, therefore, would like to be interviewed by an FBI Agent prior to his contact with this member of the "Syndicate". The individual stated that the best way to contact him would be to call him at work at any time and set up an appointment.

Date 6/5/64

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DAVID MOFEY WASS, JR., 4010 Swiss Avenue, Apartment 208A, advised he is employed as a Dental Technician at Dental Arts Laboratory, 206 Dorchester House, Dallas, Texas, and has been employed there for the past three weeks. WASS stated he was born January 26, 1920, at Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He said until two years ago he was married to ETHEL M. WASS and they resided together at Allentown, Pennsylvania, until their divorce.

Prior to coming to Dallas, Texas, WASS stated he had been living with his mother, Mrs. IDA V. WASS, Box 236, Leonard, Texas. He stated his half brother, JOHN C. SCHERER, a retired United States Air Force Major, also resides in Leonard, Texas. WASS said he had spent several weeks recuperating at his mother's residence following his release from Park Place Hospital in Port Arthur, Texas.

WASS informed that around February, 1964, he was employed as a Dental Technician by PALPH WESSLER, Owner of Towers Dental Laboratory, Medical Towers Building, Houston, Texas. During the course of this employment, WASS stated he made the acquaintance of one FRANCES GOLDEN at the Golden Cask, Port Arthur, Texas, a bar owned by PAUL COLLETTI (phonetic). WASS stated FRANCES GOLDEN resides in Groves, Texas. WASS advised that almost nightly he would meet FRANCES GOLDEN at the Golden Cask and they would spend the evening drinking together. On either March 16 or March 18, 1964, WASS stated he went to the Golden Cask and FRANCES GOLDEN was not there. He said he telephoned her at home, and she informed him their relationship was over. WASS stated he remained at the Golden Cask and, later that evening, FRANCES GOLDEN arrived. Shortly after GOLDEN arrived, WASS stated a man, whose identity is unknown to him, approached him at the bar and made some comment to the effect that he, WASS, had been bothering FRANCES GOLDEN. WASS said he denied this, whereupon this man jerked him off the bar stool and "worked him over." WASS stated he did not know the reason for this, but believes FRANCES GOLDEN "set it up." WASS advised that following this

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beating, he went to the rest room and, upon returning, went to PAUL COLLETTI, the owner of the Golden Cask, and protested the beating he had received. At this point, WASS stated COLLETTI uttered some profanities, threw him out of the Golden Cask, and also proceeded to "work him over." Following this, WASS stated he returned to the Golden Cask and called the police for assistance. He stated, however, when the police arrived they arrested him on a charge of "Disorderly Conduct" and placed him in jail, where he remained overnight.

Upon his release from jail the next day, WASS stated he went to another bar and had a beer. He advised that his chest and head were hurting so much that he called Lieutenant DUB BEALL, Port Arthur, Texas, Police Department, who advised that maybe he should go to the Park Place Hospital. WASS stated he did this. He said he was examined at the hospital by a Doctor BINSKY (phonetic), who told him he had several broken ribs and the cartilage was torn loose from his sternum. WASS stated he was confined to this hospital for several weeks.

After his release from the Park Place Hospital, Port Arthur, Texas, WASS advised he stopped at a bar, name unrecalled, for a small "libation." Upon leaving this bar, WASS stated he was again picked up by the Port Arthur, Texas, police, who took him to jail for investigation. Shortly after his arrival there, WASS advised the police informed him that he should leave town and, since he had no money, they drove him to the outskirts of Port Arthur, where he hitchhiked a ride to the home of Mrs. WILLIAM E. HARRIS, 5071 Winding Way, Dickerson, Texas, who is his twin sister. He stated he remained there for a few days, at which time he went to the home of his mother in Leonard, Texas.

On May 31, 1964, WASS stated he was in the El Dorado Bar on Haskell Street, Dallas, Texas, which is one block east of his present residence. During the course of the evening, WASS stated he struck up an acquaintance with JIM LATTIMER, an electrician, who resides at 911 Haskell Street, Room 5, Dallas, Texas,

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telephone number TA. 4-9543. WASS stated he related his above experiences to LATTIMER and LATTIMER asked him if he was interested in "getting rid of COLLETTI." WASS advised that, in trying to "draw out LATTIMER," he responded in the affirmative and was informed by LATTIMER that he would do the job for \$1,500. He said the arrangements would be \$500 down and a thousand dollars when the "job was done." As an alternate plan, WASS stated LATTIMER informed him he could get someone else to "do the job" for \$2,000, \$500 being paid down and \$1,500 when COLLETTI had been removed. WASS informed he and LATTIMER decided to discuss this matter further at WASS' apartment, where they went for some beer.

WASS stated that, in his discussions with LATTIMER at his apartment, LATTIMER informed him he was a member of "The Syndicate." He said LATTIMER did not describe "The Syndicate" further. He stated LATTIMER also informed that JACK RUBY was a member of the same "Syndicate," but stated "The Syndicate" was not involved in the shooting of LEE HARVEY OSWALD or in the assassination of President KENNEDY. He said LATTIMER stated both of these jobs were bungled and "The Syndicate" would not bungle any job they did. WASS stated LATTIMER told him "The Syndicate" was not interested in President KENNEDY, but interested in BOBBY KENNEDY.

WASS advised he does not know why LATTIMER would inform him of the above, but stated LATTIMER told him if he betrayed the confidence he would be eliminated. Further, WASS stated LATTIMER informed him that someone higher up in "The Syndicate" wanted to talk to WASS and would be around to see him on either June 3 or 4, 1964.

Concerning his past medical history, WASS informed he received a Medical Discharge from the Air Force on September 15, 1943, because of bad eyes and "a nervous condition." He said his medical diagnosis was psychoneurosis, anxiety type. He informed he had a recurrence of his nervous condition in 1948 and

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was confined to the Veterans Administration Hospital in Oakland, California, and in 1951 or 1952 was confined to the Allentown General Hospital, Allentown, Pennsylvania, which confinement was authorized by the Veterans Administration. In both of these instances, WASS stated he believes he was confined for two or three months. He said he presently draws a thirty percent service-connected disability from the Air Force.

WASS advised he is not acquainted with and, to his knowledge, has never had any contact with LEE HARVEY OSWALD or JACK RUBY. Further, WASS stated he had no information which would assist in the investigation of the assassination of President KENNEDY.

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DAVID M. WASS, Room 348, Towers Hotel, Houston, Texas, was interviewed at his request and furnished the following information:

WASS advised that he had two or three weeks ago furnished information to Special Agents of the Federal Bureau of Investigation in Dallas, Texas, regarding a "mugging" he experienced in Port Arthur, Texas; that is, he was beaten up in a bar. He stated he also furnished the name of JIM LATTIMER as being connected with a syndicate interested in killing BOBBY KENNEDY.

WASS advised that the name JIM LATTIMER was in error. The correct name for this individual is JIM LOUDERMILK. He resides in Room 5, 911 Haskell Street, Dallas, Texas. WASS described LOUDERMILK as being about twenty-eight years of age, dark wavy hair, about 5'10" tall, slender build, and is an electrician. WASS stated that LOUDERMILK carries a gold Sheriff's Office badge from some city in Oklahoma or Arkansas.

WASS also advised that LOUDERMILK's superior in "The Syndicate" is BILL HAYDEN, JR., who has telephone number BR 6-6744, in Dallas, Texas. WASS stated that HAYDEN is the individual to whom LOUDERMILK reports.

WASS further advised that he was in Houston, Texas, to discuss employment with two dentists, a Doctor ROY BELL, JR., and a Doctor RUSSEY.

On June 21, 1964, WASS telephonically advised that he had employed a private investigator by the name of W. JIM MARIBEL to look into the "Port Arthur mugging." He stated MARIBEL has business telephone number Capitol 7-5613 and residence telephone number Jackson 4-6737, both in Houston, Texas.

The following investigation was conducted by SA
JOHN G. HOUSTON at Port Arthur, Texas:

On June 25, 1964, Detective Lieutenant RICHARD SINGLETON, Identification Bureau, Port Arthur Police Department, advised a review of the Port Arthur Police Department file, Number A 29,396, revealed that DAVID MOREY WASS, JR., who gave his address as the Carousel Motel, 3330 Reveille Street, Houston, Texas, was arrested on March 20, 1964, by officers of the Port Arthur Police Department. WASS was charged with disturbing the peace at 5000 Gulfway Drive, Port Arthur, Texas. This charge was dismissed on March 21, 1964. A notation in the file reflects that WASS was drunk and causing a disturbance at the Golden Cask Club, cursing in front of women, and when asked to leave would not depart.

Detective SINGLETON advised that WASS was again arrested on March 24, 1964, on a charge of investigation, and the disposition shows he was released for the purpose of leaving town on March 24, 1964. Detective SINGLETON furnished the following description of DAVID MOREY WASS, JR., as obtained from the Port Arthur Police Department files:

Detective SINGLETON advised that their files contain an identification record from the Identification Division, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Washington, D.C., under FBI Number 816 130 E. This record reflects that on June 27, 1951, WASS was fingerprinted by the Police Department at Salinas, California, as a "sleeper" and was released and no charges filed.

Detective SINGLETON further advised that their offense report number M-1433 dated March 16, 1964, reflects that the Port Arthur Police Department was in receipt of a telephone call at 3:20 AM on March 16, 1964, from the Knowles Ambulance Service. This service reported that they were going to the Merchants Cafe, Fort Arthur, Texas, on an attempted suicide call. The report further indicates that officers from the Port Arthur Police Department made a call at this cafe and found that a DAVID WASS, a white male, was lying on the floor of the cafe bleeding from his left hand. Officers questioned WASS regarding what had happened. He stated he had taken a dental tool and stuck it in his left hand and let it bleed over the commode in the cafe. The report indicates that WASS would not tell officers where he lived or anything about himself except that he was from Houston, Texas. WASS was taken to the Park Place Hospital, Port Arthur, Texas, and treated by Dr. BENSKI.

Detective SINGLETON advised that a supplementary offense report was filed in this matter by Detective Sergeant FLOY PHILLIPS. This report reflects that DAVID WASS came to Port Arthur, Texas, from Houston, Texas, to see a girl friend and when she refused to see him he commenced drinking and "got down in the dumps and then was feeling sorry for himself and cut his hand." The report reflects that in the opinion of Detective PHILLIPS, WASS is "a little off at times," and PHILLIPS has known him for approximately two years.

The following investigation was conducted by
SA GRAHAM W. KITCHEL at Houston, Texas:

On June 29, 1964, RALPH KESSLER, Towers Dental Laboratory, Medical Towers Building, Houston, Texas, advised SA GRAHAM W. KITCHEL that DAVID WASS worked for him as a dental technician for thirteen days in about April, 1954. He advised that he considers WASS to be a drunkard and compulsive liar. In the thirteen days he worked at the Towers Dental Laboratory, he got \$400 advance payments, which he has never reimbursed.

PAUL COLLETTI, 4308 Tulane Street, Port Arthur, Texas, who is owner of the Golden Cask Supper Club, 4940 Gulfway Drive, Port Arthur, Texas, furnished the following information:

COLLETTI first met DAVID WASS as a customer who frequented his club. He stated he also recalls WASS because WASS presented what later turned out to be a non-sufficient fund check. He called the check to the attention of the Port Arthur Police Department; however, WASS later made the check good and no complaint was filed.

COLLETTI recalls that on one night during March, 1964, WASS was seated by himself at the bar, and also at the bar was a girl named FRANCES GOLDEN who was accompanied by a male companion. A verbal argument commenced between WASS and the man accompanying Mrs. GOLDEN. COLLETTI stated he paid little attention to the argument; however, within a short time one of his waiters advised him that there was a scuffle taking place in the men's restroom. COLLETTI went to the restroom and asked that the door be opened, and when opened, he noticed WASS and the male companion of Mrs. GOLDEN standing just inside the door. COLLETTI stated he did not notice any marks or bruises on WASS but WASS presented the appearance of having been shaken a bit. COLLETTI stated he had both men go back to the bar and stop arguing. He, COLLETTI, returned to his office, and WASS followed him and proceeded to explain what had happened. COLLETTI told WASS he was not interested in what had happened and all he wanted was that WASS cease arguing. WASS at that time became very belligerent and returned to the bar and continued to harass Mrs. GOLDEN and her companion with verbal abuses.

Mr. COLLETTI stated he went to the bar and asked WASS to leave, and when WASS declined to do so he had him forcibly ejected from the club. WASS continued to return to the club, and it took approximately twelve forcible removals from the club before COLLETTI called the Port Arthur Police Department, who came and arrested WASS on a charge of disturbing the peace.

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COLLETTI advised that at no time did he hit or strike WASS and used only enough force to eject him from his club.

COLLETTI stated that during the removal of WASS from his club, WASS threatened to sue COLLETTI, and on several occasions since this incident WASS has telephonically contacted COLLETTI from Houston and stated "you are going to get your's." COLLETTI refused to talk on one long distance call from WASS, and WASS is reported to have told the operator that "he had better talk to me or he will be sorry." COLLETTI stated in his opinion WASS was not drunk but appeared to have had something else besides alcohol. He stated he had seen people act the same as WASS in the past who had been under the influence of narcotics. COLLETTI advised that WASS' actions were very strange and he considered WASS to have a very serious mental problem. He stated he feels WASS is the type of person who some day may approach him, COLLETTI, and attempt to take his life.

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Detective Lieutenant W. D. BEALL, Port Arthur Police Department, Port Arthur, Texas, advised he first met DAVID WASS while working the detail on the night shift which required him to make frequent checks at bars and lounges in Port Arthur. He stated he had occasion to meet DAVID WASS at one of these bars almost every evening and through these meetings became somewhat of a friend of WASS'.

Detective BEALL advised that WASS was keeping company with FRANCES GOLDEN, a beauty parlor operator, and Mrs. GOLDEN later stopped going with him. Soon thereafter, WASS started drinking to excess and in several instances caused commotions at the various bars where he was drinking. Detective BEALL advised he recalls WASS on one occasion attempted suicide by stabbing himself in the wrist, and from this and other instances there is no doubt in his mind that WASS is suffering from some sort of mental problem.

Detective BEALL stated WASS has an acid burn on his hand and once told him that he, WASS, had to take narcotics for quite some time to kill the pain in this hand. Detective BEALL feels that WASS might be continuing the use of narcotics as on several instances WASS had stated he had been in the Veterans Administration Hospital in Houston, Texas.

Detective BEALL advised that when WASS was arrested in Port Arthur, Texas, on March 24, 1964, WASS was requested to leave town, and he, BEALL, transported WASS to the city limits and furnished him with some money.

Detective BEALL stated that while in Port Arthur, Texas, WASS passed several non-sufficient funds checks; however, no complaints were filed against WASS inasmuch as eventually all of these checks were made good.

Detective Sergeant FLOY PHILLIPS, Port Arthur, Texas Police Department, furnished the following information:

Detective PHILLIPS advised that part of his duties as a member of the Vice Squad of the Port Arthur Police Department was making frequent checks of local bars, clubs and lounges within the city. Over a period of several months in conducting these routine checks, he became acquainted with an individual by the name of DAVID WASS who frequented some of the bars he contacted. As a result of these contacts with WASS, he became "more or less WASS' friend" and as a matter of fact WASS, who is a dental technician, made PHILLIPS a pair of gun grips.

PHILLIPS stated WASS appeared to be having trouble with a girl friend of his and started drinking to excess. In many instances he caused disturbances in the bars in which he was drinking. PHILLIPS advised that when WASS drank he seemed to drink to excess, but when he was not drinking he was an excellent dental technician. WASS' girl friend continued to give him problems and it was not long until WASS started writing non-sufficient fund checks drawn on a bank in Houston, Texas. PHILLIPS stated that when these matters were brought to WASS' attention he usually made restitution.

Detective PHILLIPS described WASS as a person who liked a lot of attention, wanted sympathy and enjoyed having people talk to him. On one night WASS seemed "to go crazy" at the Golden Cask Club, Port Arthur, Texas, and caused a disturbance which brought about his being ejected from the club and placed in jail.

Detective PHILLIPS advised that in his opinion he feels WASS is suffering from some sort of mental problem and should be in an institution.

JOHN H. TEMPLAIN, Office Manager, Park Place Hospital, Port Arthur, Texas, advised a search of the hospital records under the name of DAVID MOREY WASS, JR., reflects the following information:

Mr. TEMPLAIN stated the first time WASS was admitted was on March 19, 1963, and was discharged on March 24, 1963, his case being listed as acute anxiety.

Mr. TEMPLAIN stated the next time WASS was admitted was on March 16, 1964, and was released on March 20, 1964, his case given as acute anxiety, attempted suicide.

Mr. TEMPLAIN stated WASS was re-admitted on March 21, 1964, and discharged on March 23, 1964, his case listed as acute anxiety reaction.

Mr. TEMPLAIN advised that upon WASS' discharge on March 23, 1964, he understood that WASS was leaving Port Arthur and attempting to enter the Veterans Administration Hospital at Houston, Texas.

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Dr. RAYMOND BENSKI, 109 - 12th Street, Nederland, Texas, furnished the following information:

Dr. BENSKI reviewed his medical records and advised that he first saw DAVID MOREY WASS, JR., on March 16, 1964, when WASS was admitted to the Park Place Hospital, Port Arthur, Texas. WASS was admitted after having become upset and had threatened suicide. Dr. BENSKI advised that his inquiry of WASS as to why he attempted suicide revealed that WASS had an automobile which developed mechanical trouble and he thought he would be unable to return to his job in Houston.

Dr. BENSKI stated he treated WASS for a small nick on his hand and prescribed a mild tranquilizer. WASS was released from the hospital on March 18, 1964.

Dr. BENSKI advised that his records reflect WASS was readmitted to the hospital on March 18, 1964, due to a case of overexposure. Dr. BENSKI advised that he interviewed WASS and determined that WASS had missed his bus to Houston, Texas, and tried to hitchhike. He was unable to secure a ride, and due to a severe rain storm he was returned to the hospital by the Port Arthur Police Department.

Dr. BENSKI advised WASS was again released from the Park Place Hospital on March 21, 1964, but came back later in the evening stating he had gone to a local club for a drink and was beaten and complained of weakness, shock and soreness over his body. Dr. BENSKI stated he afforded WASS a thorough physical examination of the chest, back and ribs and discovered no injury. He stated WASS was also furnished extensive X-ray examination of his entire body and no injuries were revealed. WASS was again discharged on March 23, 1964.

Dr. BENSKI further advised he telephonically contacted the Veterans Administration office in Houston, Texas, and he was advised that WASS should be sent to the outpatient care section. Dr. BENSKI later mailed the Veterans Administration Hospital in Houston, Texas, a summary of WASS' case

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history and a recommendation that WASS be afforded further psychiatric care.

Dr. BENSKI stated he at no time told WASS he had broken ribs or a cartilage being torn loose from his sternum. He stated on every contact with WASS he was given a thorough physical examination and other than suffering from over-exposure and a slight nick on the hand, he discovered no injuries.

Mrs. ETHEL KILOPHENSTEIN, owner of the rooming house located 911 Haskell Avenue, Dallas, Texas, advised on June 29, 1964, that JAMES "HOAGIE" LOUDERMILK occupied room 5 at that address from May 12, 1964, until June 22, 1964, when he left, owing \$14.

Mrs. KILOPHENSTEIN advised that LOUDERMILK was employed at an awning company on Gaston Avenue around the corner from the rooming house. She stated LOUDERMILK was always "broke" and tried to borrow money from everyone at the rooming house.

A. H. HENNING, President, Dallas Tent and Awning Company, 3921 Gaston Avenue, advised on June 30, 1964, that JAMES WILEY LOUDERMILK, who goes by the name of "HOAGIE," was employed by him as a laborer from April 24, 1964, to June 24, 1964. He had Social Security Number 432-66-4480. He resided at 911 Haskell Avenue, Dallas, Texas.

HENNING stated LOUDERMILK informed him that his wife had been killed in an automobile accident and his parents were raising his child. He said his mother-in-law was trying to get custody of the child and he wanted two weeks off to return to Arkoma, Oklahoma, where his parents were living and to get the matter of custody of his child settled.

HENNING said that LOUDERMILK also told him that he had a nervous breakdown following the death of his wife, and, on the advice of his doctor, got a job doing outdoor work when he had been previously employed doing office work.

HENNING stated that LOUDERMILK would tell contradictory stories and overestimate his abilities. He also said he doubts that he will re-employ LOUDERMILK when he returns from Oklahoma.

HENNING described LOUDERMILK as being 24 years of age, 5'11" tall, weight about 150 pounds, slender build, with dark brown hair and brown eyes.

Mrs. A. H. HENNING, Dallas Tent and Awning Company, advised on June 30, 1964, that LOUDERMILK informed her that when he arrived in Dallas, Texas, he "blacked out" at the bus station and spent two weeks in Baylor University Medical Center, Dallas, Texas. She said he was treated by a Dr. DYLL, a neurosurgeon.

Mrs. HENNING advised that LOUDERMILK informed her he had been previously employed by a ladder company at Seagoville, Texas. Mrs. HENNING also stated that LOUDERMILK told contradictory stories and would exaggerate.

JOYCE CORNELIUS, Clerk, Records Bureau, Dallas Police Department, advised on June 29, 1964, that records of the Dallas Police Department contain no record of JAMES WILEY LOUDERMILK.

 This record reflects that tests conducted on LOUDERMILK disclosed
 he had many symptoms associated with dizziness. His neurological
 examination was negative and his laboratory tests were normal.
 LOUDERMILK was given the provisional diagnosis of vertigo and
 dizziness, probable cerebral lesion.

James Wiley Loudermilk was advised he did not have to make a statement and that any statement he did make could be used against him in a court of law. He was further advised by SA Henry B. Lowrey of his right to consult an attorney before making a statement.

Loudermilk, after being so advised, furnished the following information:

In January, 1964, Loudermilk and one ~~James Christian~~ of Arkoma, Oklahoma, were in Long Beach, California, out of work.

They were traveling in a 1958 Plymouth, the property of Loudermilk. When unable to obtain employment in Long Beach, they traveled in this same vehicle to the home of Louise Munn, an aunt of Loudermilk's, 211 North Kauffman, Seagoville, Texas. At Seagoville they lived at the home of Mrs. Munn and obtained employment with the Wolf-Denning Ladder Corporation at Seagoville where they both were employed until April 1, 1964, when Loudermilk resigned after some differences arose between Loudermilk and his foreman, Adrian Thornton. Loudermilk returned to Arkoma, Oklahoma. James Christian remained in the employment of the Wolf-Denning Ladder Company at Seagoville.

Approximately the middle of April, 1964, Loudermilk returned to Dallas, Texas, via bus. At the time he stepped off the bus in Dallas, he became very ill and passed out on the street. He was taken to the Baylor Hospital in Dallas by a passing taxi driver, remained in the hospital for a period of one week, and was released.

After Loudermilk's release from the hospital he went to the Dallas Tent and Awning Company where he obtained employment, his time of entry on duty being the following Monday. Loudermilk worked for the Dallas Tent and Awning Company until Wednesday, June 24, 1964, and while so employed resided at the Hill Hotel, Room 5, 911 Haskell Street in Dallas. When he resigned from the Tent and Awning Company on June 24, 1964, he returned to Arkoma, Oklahoma, where he has been residing since.

Loudermilk claimed he had been arrested only one time, in 1960 when he, along with one Frankie Ross of Fort Smith, Arkansas, was arrested and paid a \$25 fine for taking coins from a Coca-Cola machine in Fort Smith.

He said that approximately the latter part of May or the first of June, 1964, which was about three weeks before he left Dallas to return to Arkoma, Oklahoma, he met one David Nass in the El Dorado Lounge, located in the 1000 Block Haskell Street in Dallas. During this three week period they visited on several occasions at the El Dorado Bar and also swam together in the pool connected with the apartment where Nass was residing. He stated that one night when both were very drunk, he had stayed at the apartment with NASS.

Loudermilk stated that his conversations with Wass were general and concerned no particular topic. He did recall, however, that on an occasion or two they did discuss the assassination of President John F. Kennedy, but only in a general way and from what they had read in the papers, not from actual knowledge. He said he did remember that during one of their conversations someone in the crowd at the bar remarked, "I wonder who is going to shoot Jack Ruby." He could not remember the name of the individual who made this remark, but described him as a large, fat man whom they had met at the lounge, an individual who claimed he had been a member of a Syndicate in and around Dallas. He did not identify the Syndicate or any alleged members of a Syndicate. Loudermilk claimed he saw this man on only one or two occasions, each time at the lounge. He claimed that on another occasion he did hear this unidentified fat man talk about a magazine article he had read in the Saturday Evening Post, an article indicating that the associates of James Alloffa might try to kill Bobby Kennedy. To the best of his memory, this was the only mention of Bobby Kennedy, and at no time did he recall hearing anyone remark that there had been any intent by anyone to kill Bobby Kennedy.

Loudermilk advised that while he could not identify the fat man at the lounge, one Fred Brown, an employee at the El Dorado Lounge, would probably be able to furnish the name and employment of the fat man in question. T-x

He said he was not acquainted with a Frances Golden or any person named Colletti; however, on one occasion, Wass asked him if he would get rid of Colletti for Wass. He told Wass that he did not even know the man. Wass then tried to get him to go to Port Arthur, Texas, with him, but Loudermilk refused. During the remainder of the evening, Loudermilk said that Wass continued his efforts to get Loudermilk to get rid of Colletti, but at no time was an offer made by either party. He said the reason Wass wanted Colletti eliminated was never explained in detail, but it was in regard to a beating Colletti allegedly gave Wass in Port Arthur, Texas.

Loudermilk denied that he is or ever has been a member of any type of Syndicate in Dallas or anywhere else. To the best of his knowledge, he had never discussed a Syndicate with anyone.

Loudermilk added that he did remember that the fat man at the lounge on one occasion remarked that Jack Ruby was a member of a Syndicate; that the Syndicate probably would get rid of Ruby, as the act of Ruby would leave a black mark on the Syndicate. Loudermilk claimed that at no time did he know what the fat man was talking about.

In regard to Bill Hayden, Jr., Loudermilk stated that he met Hayden in Baylor Hospital, Hayden being a patient there during the same period that Loudermilk was confined, an acquaintanceship of only one week. His only contact with Hayden since had been by telephone when, at the request of Hayden, he, Loudermilk, assisted one Bill Waters, a friend of Hayden, in obtaining employment at the Dallas Tent and Awning Company. In turn, Loudermilk was going to request that Hayden assist David Nass in obtaining employment. He said this was his only association with and knowledge of Hayden; that he had no knowledge that Hayden might be a member of a Syndicate; that at no time had Hayden mentioned a Syndicate. He said he does not know the address or place of employment of Hayden but, while, they were together in the hospital, Hayden had told him he, Hayden, was a Certified Public Accountant operating his own firm in Dallas. He said Hayden is a man approximately 40 to 45 years of age.

Loudermilk denied that he had ever carried a badge of any type; denied any knowledge of a Syndicate operating in the vicinity of Dallas, Texas, and denied knowledge of the assassination of President Kennedy, other than what he had read in various newspapers, and heard on radio and television. He added that at no time had he ever claimed to be a member of a Syndicate, nor had he ever claimed to be acquainted with or associated with members of any Syndicate.

Loudermilk stated he has been married three times, his first wife being Paula Brown Loudermilk, by whom he has a son named Dave Collins. He said he had been divorced from Paula in 1961 at Fort Smith, Arkansas.

He then married one Trudy Young of Fort Smith, Arkansas, from whom he had been divorced at Fort Smith, Arkansas, in May, 1964. He then married one Maxine Holmes, also known as Cindy, a striptease dancer at the Top Hat Club near Fort Smith. At the present time they are separated but not divorced.

This investigation was predicated upon a telephone call from the Dallas Police Department advising Mrs. J. D. TIPPIT, widow of deceased officer J. D. TIPPIT, had received an extortion letter.

MARIE FRANCES GASSWAY TIPPIT, also known as Mrs. J. D. TIPPIT, advised that her true name is MARIE FRANCES GASSWAY TIPPIT and she resides at 238 Glencairn in Dallas, Texas; her telephone number is CA 4-2294. She said that her late husband, J. D. TIPPIT, was killed by LEE HARVEY OSWALD on November 22, 1963, shortly after President KENNEDY was assassinated at Dallas, Texas.

Mrs. TIPPIT advised that when the mail was delivered on January 13, 1964, she received a threatening letter which was post-marked Amsterdam, and the sender's address on the reverse side of the envelope was "D. EVERSHERE" and the extortion note was signed "THOMAS WILLIAM EVERSHERE." She said that the note requested that she send \$35,000 to a Swiss bank, and mentioned that her husband had an interest in a factory.

She said since this letter contained a threat, she immediately notified the Dallas Police Department through Sergeant C. B. ~~X~~OWENS, Radio Patrol Officer.

Mrs. TIPPIT advised that several of her friends and neighbors were present when she called the Dallas Police Department and these persons handled this letter.

She was advised if she received additional letters, they should not be handled.

She made the letter available and said it might be used for any examination, and she would appreciate it being returned to her after the necessary examinations were made.

Mrs. TIPPIT said that she would obtain the exact names and addresses of the persons who had handled the note, and she felt that they would all be perfectly willing to be fingerprinted in order to furnish elimination prints.

Mrs. TIPPIT made available the extortion letter which reads as follows:

"Germany, 1st Januari
1964. EUROPE.

"Concerns: Factory of Your Husband's in Germany.

"Dear Madam,

"No doubt, it will surprise You very much hearing of a
Factory of Your deceased husband, but it is real true.

"There is a lot of things You have not heard of, hence,
we have taken the liberty to send You this letter. Please,
realize the following sentences are of paramount importance,
not only to You, but also to important personalities, so take
good notice of them.

"President Kennedy has been liquidated and Your husband has
been murdered the same day, a few days later, Lee Oswald has
been shot down by Ruby. Have You never thought there must be
a secret connection between Oswald and Ruby? Well, dear
Madam, there has been indeed, and more, Your husband was also a
member of the gang. Amazed at it? Madam believe us, we have
all evidence here with us. The death of President Kennedy must
be attributed to a fanatic political opponent of the President,
a certain Governor of one of the States of the USA.

"The Governor did not feel safe with regards to the Election
of President next year, so that Kennedy should be disappeared.
In order to achieve this result, this opponent sought contact
with Oswald, of whom was known to be a very strong antipode of
the American Intern Policy, and also with us.

"After Oswald had succeeded in liquidating Pres. Kennedy, Your
husband had the order to act as if he was going to arrest Oswald.
Unfortunately, Oswald did not recognize Your husband for some
reason, and so he shot him down.

"Further, each of us should receive an amount of hundred thousand dollars from the said Governor. As agreed upon, the Governor should pay 75% in advance and the remainder by us self,

"However, Your husband is no more to pay his part of the remainder ad. 35,000 dollars. Will You please complete the work of Your husbands? Evidently, his was doing this for You and his children, beside, let him not gave his life for nothing.

"Moreover, if the money should not be paid in time, the sellers of the Factory may get impatiently and spoil the whole thing.

"Of course, You do not have to remain share-holder if You do not want to, later You can sell Your share again. This is done only to prevent difficulties for the time being.

"So dear Madam, do not be too self-conceited or suspicious, later everthing will be clear to You. It is urgent, so hurry, Madam, send 35.000 dollars then You and we are safe, do not wait too lang.

"Go to Your Bank and send us a covered cheque of the said amount, or open a Bank Account with a Bank at Switserland, without conditions. On name of WOLFGANG AE 090822, message of confirmation may be sent to Mr. Charles Rozenblod, Admiralegracht 142.L, Amsterdam, The Netherlands.

"Please realize, Madam, if You refuse to cooperate, You will dig Your own grave, besides, You have nothing to loose.

"It is worth finishing the job, Your husband has started for You and children, so pick up the, were Your husband had had to drop it.

"In conclusion, we wish you success, wisdom and courage.

On January 14, 1964, the letter and envelope addressed to Mrs. TIPPIT were forwarded to the FBI Laboratory.

By communication dated January 27, 1964, the FBI Laboratory advised the typewriting on the letter and envelope was not identified with any of the material in the Anonymous Letter File. The typewriting was prepared on a machine equipped with a foreign style of type known as Ransmeyer and is manufactured in West Germany and the manufacturer is alleged to be the world's largest exclusive manufacturer of typewriter type. The manufacturer also supplies several American typewriting companies in addition to major European companies for this particular style of type.

The physical characteristics of the paper were examined and no watermarks, indented writings, or other significant features were noted which would indicate the source of the paper used.

Two latent fingerprints of value were developed on the letter. No latent impressions of value were developed on the envelope.

By communication dated February 3, 1964, the Bureau advised the indices failed to identify the writer of the letter.

By communication dated February 4, 1964, a confidential source abroad advised as follows:

Dr. ALFRED CARREL, Swiss Central Police Bureau, has informed that it would be impracticable to attempt to locate a numbered bank account in Switzerland without knowing the name of the bank or the city where the account was located.

It is noted that in the original letter in this case it is not indicated that this account has already been opened but it is asked that an account be opened.

By communication dated February 11, 1964, a confidential source abroad advised as follows:

Mr. WIM M. REHORST, Directie Politie, The Hague, The Netherlands, advised orally on February 7, 1964, that EVERSHIRE is known to his agency and is reputed to be insane. He said EVERSHIRE had recently sent a similar extortion letter to the German Industrialist, KRUPP.

Mr. REHORST has asked competent police authorities in The Netherlands to render a report substantiating his own personal recollection of the matter.

By communication dated April 8, 1964, a confidential source abroad advised as follows:

Officers of the Amsterdam (Netherlands) Municipal Police made inquiries at the Amsterdam Register Office and discovered that the occupant at Admiralengracht 142, first floor, Amsterdam, is ALWIN EDGAR PHILIP WOLFGANG, born August 9, 1922, at Paramaribo. WOLFGANG is a streetcar conductor employed by the Amsterdam Municipal Transport Company. Police Inspector A. G. M. JOZEN was advised by the Personnel Department of the aforementioned company that WOLFGANG is employed as a streetcar conductor and is at present being trained for the third time as a driver. He is considered by company officials to be a rather strange individual who feels he is discriminated against because of the place of his birth and because he is a Negro.

WOLFGANG was summoned to Headquarters, Amsterdam Police Department, by Inspector JOZEN on February 13, 1964. In response to questions, he stated the following: His full name is ALWIN EDGAR PHILIP WOLFGANG, and he was born August 9, 1922, at Paramaribo, and presently resides at Admiralengracht 142, first floor, Amsterdam, The Netherlands. He is married to the former CELIA JACOBS, who was born October 23, 1933, at Utrecht, The Netherlands. *X W. J. G.*

The following is a quoted statement from WOLFGANG, translated from Dutch:

"The letter to Mrs. Tippit has been quite invented by me and typed with my own typewriter. In that letter I used the plural form and spoke of a gang to give the impression that things were real. The subject-matter for that letter did I take from newspaper reports, for instance a report on the alleged secret association between Oswald and Ruby. My mentioning a Governor does not refer to a particular person. This has been quite invented. I fixed the sum of money at such a large amount so as to suggest that it was a real case, so not a begging-letter. The name Charles Rozenblad is the name of my half-brother. He has not any knowledge of this affair. The signature to

"the letter has been put by myself. I am no longer able to make a similar signature. I know no person by the name of THOMAS WILLIAM EVERSHERE. I think EVERSHERE is a place in England. When I had written that letter I waited before posting it until Thursday, because I thought that day would be a lucky day, this as to the possible consequences of that letter. I now fully realise that the contents of the letter are mean and on further consideration I would have done better by not writing it. There is no such organisation that occupy themselves with these practices.

"The reasons why I have written the letter are these:

- "(1) a desire for sensation;
- "(2) greed for money, an easy way to get money;
- "(3) the misjudgement of my being capable of writing letters in a foreign language.

"I think myself the best man in the world, a sort of super-man. I don't trust any organization or fellow-man. Generally I feel myself put behind because I am a Negro. It is my feeling that the colour of my skin prevents me from getting on in life. I myself have a feeling and an idea that I am capable of doing more or being more than I do or am at the present moment. I must say that I have not experienced that I have really been put behind in the Netherlands.

"I wish to state in addition that early in January, 1964, I wrote a similar letter to an old lady-singer in Italy who had appeared at a theatre in Austria. In this letter I asked for a remittance of a sum of money to me under the code-number WOLFGANG AE 090822. It may be that I used other words or names, but the purport of this letter was the same.

"In June, 1963, when the Profumo Affair was on, I wrote a letter to Mrs. Profumo, in which letter I told her that I was in possession of certain documents of Christine Keeler in which she reveals secrets to the Russian Attache, who was also involved in that affair. I also asked to remit a certain sum of money and if

"this would not be done I would send the documents to Scotland Yard. All the things in the letter had been made up. I kept one copy each of all the letters I had written, until I became aware that the police had found out that I was the writer of those letters. I then burnt them.

"I promise that I will never occupy myself with these practices again, because I now see that my writing such letters is mean and immoral."

Inspector JOZEN stated that he considered WOLFGANG not quite normal. When JOZEN interviewed him, WOLFGANG was very nervous and often stammered in answering questions. A difficult question put to him would cause him to squirm in his chair and stammer. Inspector JOZEN said it is his opinion that WOLFGANG has an inferiority complex and tries to compensate by writing letters of the type he wrote to Mrs. TIPPIT.

The Directie Politie, Ministry of Justice, The Hague, The Netherlands, reported that WOLFGANG should be considered as mentally subnormal, and that therefore his case is being handled as a pathological, rather than as a criminal action. His mental state is being reported to the company which employs him.

WOLFGANG has no criminal record in The Netherlands.

By communication dated April 8, 1964, a confidential source abroad advised the original of the letter which WOLFGANG sent to West German industrialist KRUPP was being forwarded to the FBI Laboratory.

By communication dated April 23, 1964, the FBI Laboratory advised it was concluded that the typewriting on the letter addressed to Mrs. TIPPIT was prepared on the typewriter used to prepare a letter written to industrialist KRUPP of Germany. Both were purportedly typed on a Remington typewriter with Rem-Riter type number Nr 320641 belonging to ALWIN EDGAR PHILIP WOLFGANG.

By communication dated April 28, 1964, the FBI Laboratory advised the latent fingerprints developed on the letter to Mrs. TIPPIT were not identical with the fingerprints of ALWIN EDGAR WOLFGANG.

On May 18, 1964, the facts of this case were presented to Assistant United States Attorney B. H. TIMMINS, Jr., Dallas, Texas, at which time he declined prosecution due to the fact ALWIN EDGAR PHILIP WOLFGANG is considered mentally subnormal and that the case is being handled in The Netherlands as a pathological rather than a criminal case.
