Destruction of this file was in compliance with mandated file destruction file procedures outlined in YBI Headquarters letter to Albany dated October 28, 1977, eaptioned "Destruction of Field Files and Records." This letter advised all field offices that the National Archives and Records Services and the DOJ had granted approval for the FBI to reduce the retention period from ten years to five years for closed criminal files maintained in field offices. Agent in Charge, Bill D. Williams, now assigned to the Miami Field Office of the FBI, was the Kansas City official responsible for assuring that mandated file destruction was earried out consistent with existing instructions.





Mr. Turner advised that the Civil Rights
Division, based upon its review of the HSCA findings,
will recommend to the Attorney General in
writing that no further investigation is warranted
into the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.

Mr. Keuch stated that further analysis of certain scientific data should be conducted as recommended in the HSCA final report.

Specifically, Mr. Keuch questioned whether the FBI Laboratory could subject the Bronson film to computer analysis and whether the photograph taken by Mary Moorman could be analyzed for further study.

(The Charles L. Bronson film depicted the Texas School Book Depository several minutes before the assassination of John F. Kennedy, including the 6th floor window from which the fatal shot was fired.

The Mary Moorman photograph, a Polaroid, depicted the grassy knoll area and was taken at the time the fatal shot was fired. This photograph was deemed by HSCA photographic experts as being of limited usefulness because of its poor quality and deterioration over the years.)

Mr. Keuch was advised that such photographic analysis involving computer analysis and enhancement could not be conducted within the FBI Laboratory, but would have to be handled by outside contract.

Mr. Keuch indicated that he planned to request in writing that the Technical Services Division review the scientific acoustical evidence which HSCA believed would support their findings of "... a high probability that 2 gunmen fired at President John F. Kennedy." Mr. Keuch stated that after reviewing this material, he desired the FBI furnish recommendations as to whether there exists sufficient data to warrant further scientific testing as recommended by HSCA.

SYNOPSIS: On 6/12/79 the FBI received approximately 4,463 pages of material which the HSCA intended to disclose (publish). The material was furnished in accordance with the 10/5/77 Memorandum of Understanding (MU) between the Department of Justice (DOJ) and the Committee. The material was reviewed by the FBI in order to identify items of information, the categories of which might constitute permissible objections to disclosure of same under the MU. On 6/15/79 the objectionable items of information were discussed with former HSCA Chief Counsel G. Robert Blakey, who agreed to make certain modifications or corrections to resolve the objections. He declined to do so in two instances wherein - Mr. Bruemmer Mr. Mintz - Mr. Steel Mr. Mullen (1 - Mr. Lawn; 1 - Mr. Gov - Mr. Boynton zw. RPA Mr. Bailey 1 - Mr. Moschella CONTINUED - OVER

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FBI Objection: The specificity of the information tended to compromise FBI sources.

Published Language: Page 589, supra, now states "...The FBI learned that the July 26 Movement was planning a raid on Cuba from Texas. In connection with this raid, armaments shipments were sent to McKeown. (1704)..."

Note: The substantive objection is removed by the published language which sets forth the identical wording recommended by the FBI.

RE ASSASSINATION OF MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. (MLK)

ITEM (1):

Published Language: "...the committee was able only to (b) review the files of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), which were attained by committee subpens from local authorities..."

Note: The objection is removed by the published language.

ITEM (2):

(Report, page 328, paragraph 4)

Original Language: "...In a conversation with Jerry's response to a general question concerning his brother's involvement in the assassination was:..."





FBI Objection: Such specificity regarding the source of the information tends to identify or compromise the source.

Published Language: "...In a conversation with an acquaintance, Jerry's general response to a question concerning his brother's involvement in the assassination was:..." (Report, page 332, paragraph 6)

Note: The substantive objection is removed by the published language which sets forth the wording recommended by the FBI.

ITEM (3):

Original Language:

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FBI Objection: Such language tended to compromise FBI sources.

Published Language: "...The informants were either unavailable or uncooperative. (26)..." (Report, page 378, paragraph 3)

Note: The substantive objection is removed by the published language which was recommended by the FBI.

ITEM (4):

(bXi)

FBI Objection: Such language tended to compromise FBI sources.

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Published Language: "... Shelton advised that in August 1968 the defense was in need of money for Ray's defense. Shelton inquiry whether Klan members would be willing to donate money for Ray's defense..." (Report, page 379, paragraph 6)

Note: The substantive objection is removed by the published language.

ITEM (5):

FBI Objection: Such language tended to compromise FBI sources.

Published Language: "... Shelton added that he intended to review the jury list in Ray's case when it was available. (36) ... Source B learned that a UKA board meeting was held in 1969, and attended by Hanes and Melvin Sexton, the UKA secretary who handled Klan finances, among others..." (Report, page 379, paragraphs 6 and 7)

Note: The substantive objection is removed by the published language.


ITEM (6):

Original Language: "...in Miami Magazine in October, 1966..."

FBI Objection: The 1966 date is in error and should be 1976.

Published Language: "...in Miami Magazine Somersett..." (Report, page 402, paragraph 5)





Note: The published language omits the erroneous date thereby removing the objection.

### ITEM (7):

Original Language: "...The committee identified the FBI informant in SCLC without the assistance of the FBI. He acknowledged his former informant status in a committee interview in which he was asked about the nature of his relationship with the Bureau..."

FBI Objection: Such language tended to give rise to the inference that the HSCA learned of the informant's identity through a review of FBI files.

Published Language: "...The committee learned of the identity of the SCLC informant when he acknowledged his former status in a committee interview; he was also asked about the nature of his relationship with the Bureau;..." (Report, footnote 4, page 410)

Note: The objection is removed by the published language.

### ITEM (8):

Original Language: "...While the evidence was insufficient to link COINTELPRO to the assassination, the committee obtained ample evidence to warrant strong condemnation of FBI efforts that were directed against Dr. King and SCLC for the risk they created for Dr. King. The editorial writers at the Globe-Democrat were exercising first amendment freedoms, so their conduct was constitutionally privileged. There was, however, no similar privilege covering the conduct of the FBI. Not only did this conduct contribute to the hostile climate that surrounded Dr. King, it was morally reprehensible, illegal, felonious, and unconstitutional. There is no place in a free society for such governmental conduct. It deserves the strongest condemnation..."

FBI Objection: The HSCA failed to provide sufficient evidence in its report to warrant such language.

Published Language: Remains the same as above (Report, page 441, paragraph 3).

Note: Mr. Blakey declined to modify this statement of HSCA opinion when the issue was raised with him on 6/15/79. It should also be noted that this objection cannot be construed as a permissible objection under the MU.

ITEM (9):

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Published Language: "...Washington requested Canadian authorities to review Canadian passports records. (127)..." (Report, page 449, paragraph 1)

Note: The objection is removed by the published language.

ITEM (10):

Original Language: "...In addition, the panel determined that the previously unidentified photograph 115, developed from a coupon from Eric S. Galt to Modern Photo Bookstore, bears an impression made by the left thumb of James Earl Ray..."

FBI Objection: The above language is incorrect since the FBI originally identified photograph 115 as an impression of Ray's left thumb and, therefore, the HSCA only confirmed this identification.

Published Version (MLK Appendix, Volume XIII): (1) On page 116, under photograph 115, the Q number of 326 is added in parenthesis following "Bookstore"; (2) on page 117, information concerning the identification of photograph 115 is listed in the correct order under paragraph 32; (3) the sentence in the last paragraph on page 117, paragraph 33, beginning with "in addition," is deleted.
