Reference is made to memorandum dated 2/4/64 from Mr. Belmont to Mr. Tolson setting forth information concerning the defection of the subject, reported by CIA to be a KGB official. James Angleton, CIA, furnished the following to the Liaison Agent on 2/4/64. *u*

CIA had hoped to keep the subject in place for a period of time but the subject insisted that he make the break with the Soviets and specifically asked for asylum. CIA made plans on 2/4/64, to move him to Germany where interrogation will continue. The agency will move him to the U. S. but this may not take place for two or three weeks. *u*

Angleton emphasized very strongly that CIA officials still have strong doubts concerning subject's bona fides. Outwardly, he has displayed all the characteristics of a legitimate defector. However, some of his statements conflict with data already in possession of CIA. Since he could be a Soviet plant, CIA feared that the Soviets may have been perpetrating some type of operation designed to embarrass the U. S. Government at the Disarmament Conference in Geneva. This could be done by the Soviets announcing to the world that CIA endeavored to recruit a Soviet member of the delegation. Because of this possibility, McCone decided to brief Dean Rusk on 2/4/64. *u*

Angleton stated that the subject already has furnished information concerning Americans who were recruited or who were targets for recruitment in Moscow. These Americans would be visitors, tourists, and people attached to our embassy. Angleton hopes to furnish the Liaison Agent all pertinent data received on 2/5/64.

At 12:55 p.m. today James Angleton of CIA called to advise that Yuri Nonsenko, for ten years on the American desk of the Second Chief Directorate, of KGB, in Moscow, has defected to CIA in Switzerland. CIA has him in a safe house. *ku*

Angleton said that Nonsenko is the source of information CIA furnished to us on an individual named *[redacted]*

[redacted] Nonsenko allegedly has information concerning Americans who have been dealing with the Russians. *ku*

Angleton said that CIA does not regard Nonsenko as a bona fide defector as yet; however, they are going ahead and will handle him as a defector unless they are overruled by higher authorities. In this connection Mr. McCone is advising Secretary Dean Rusk of this development in the next half hour. *ku*

Angleton said that General Carter will furnish further details on this to the executive committee of the US Intelligence Board tomorrow.

ACTION:

We are checking our files to see if we have anything on Nonsenko and will maintain close contact with CIA through liaison as to developments in this matter and as to any information Nonsenko might have of pertinence to the Bureau's work and responsibilities.

At the US Intelligence Board meeting on 2/5/64, General Carter of CIA briefly discussed, in executive session, the case of Nosenko. ^u

He advised that Nosenko was born 10/30/27, and was a staff officer in the Counterintelligence Directorate of KGB, directed against U.S. citizens; that he was with the disarmament conference for 18 months and first contacted CIA in June, 1962. He has provided data regarding Soviet personalities. ^u

Carter said that Nosenko is now a "walk-in" in Switzerland, and is being taken to West Germany. ^u

Carter advised that CIA has reservations about the bona fides of Nosenko and CIA is endeavoring to establish such bona fides. ^u

The 2/11/64 issue of "The Washington Post" carries a State Department announcement of the defection at Geneva, Switzerland, of Yuri I. Nosenko. He is described as a Soviet secret police officer who was in Geneva as a member of the Soviet Delegation to the Disarmament Conference. The Director inquires, "Do we know anything about this?" u

We were first made aware of Nosenko's defection when James Angleton of CIA telephonically reported this to Mr. Belmont on 2/4/64. Angleton advised that Nosenko, who was on the American Desk of the Second Chief Directorate of the KGB (Committee for State Security) in Moscow for ten years, had defected to CIA in Switzerland and CIA had him in a safe house. Angleton's information was reported in memorandum from Mr. Belmont to Mr. Tolson on 2/4/64. u

Angleton subsequently advised that subject first contacted CIA in June, 1962, and furnished some information concerning Soviet intelligence activities. Angleton emphasized very strongly that CIA officials have strong doubts concerning subject's bona fides. [Subject claims to be knowledgeable of Americans who came to Moscow as visitors, tourists, or as employees of the American Embassy and were recruited or were targets for recruitment. CIA has been furnishing us memoranda setting forth the information received by subject concerning these Americans. Some of the information relates to cases which the Bureau is now handling or has handled in the past. Each item is being carefully reviewed and investigative action being instituted where necessary.]

SUBJECT: Yuriy Ivanovich NOSENKO

1. Yuriy Ivanovich NOSENKO, who defected to American authorities in Geneva, Switzerland, on 4 February 1964, was born in Nikolayev, USSR, on 30 October 1927. To date he has provided the following information on his education and career:

1950 Graduated from the Institute of International Affairs, Moscow.

1950-1953 Military service in the Soviet Navy, assigned to the Fifth Section (radio intercept) of the Intelligence Directorate, Ministry of Navy. He served during the Korean War monitoring U. N. forces radio traffic. At some time prior to 1953, he returned to Moscow, when he was assigned to the Baltic area training teams for stay-behind activity in the event of war.

1953 In February of this year he transferred to the (then) MVD (predecessor of the present Committee for State Security - KGB). He attended the Counterintelligence School for about a year.

1953-1954 Upon completion of the CI School, Subject was assigned to the First (American) Department, Second Chief Directorate (SCD), KGB. Subject's first assignment therein was in that section of the First Department which covered American journalists.

1955 At this time a new department was created, within the Second Chief Directorate, for counterintelligence against tourists. Subject was transferred to this department, which currently has the numerical designation of Seventh Department, SCD, KGB. While assigned to the Seventh Department, Subject was on occasion assigned temporarily to the U. S. Embassy Section of the First Department,

- 1960 In February of this year, Subject was assigned to the U. S. Embassy Section, First Department, SCD, KGB, where he became Deputy Chief.
- 1962 In January, Subject, after having turned down the job of Chief of the U. S. Embassy Section, because of his friendship with the incumbent chief, was reassigned to the Tourist Department as Chief of the American Tourist Section.
- 1964 Sometime between June 1962 and January 1964, Subject was promoted to the position of First Deputy Chief, Seventh (Tourist) Department, SCD, KGB, the job which he held at the time of his defection.

2. During his KGB career, Subject has had four temporary assignments abroad. The first of these was to Lond, England, in October or November 1958. Subject travelled as a member of the Soviet Light Athletics Association using the name Yuriy Ivanovich NIKOLAYEV. He has stated that he had a KGB mission on this trip which required that he work with the KGB resident in London. Details on this mission have not yet been received. In October 1960, Subject requested a U. S. visa (in true name) as a member of the Soviet Automotive Exchange Delegation. This particular exchange group was postponed to the next year, and Subject did not come to the U. S. Subject travelled to Cuba in November-December 1960 to find out how the Cuban intelligence service was working against the United States. Subject's third trip abroad was to Geneva, Switzerland, as a member of the Soviet Delegation to the United Nations Disarmament Conference of that year, March-June 1962. On this trip, Subject had both security and operational assignments. In January of 1964, Subject travelled again to Geneva as a member of the Soviet Delegation to the Disarmament Conference.

3. In June 1962, Subject held the rank of Major in the KGB, and was due for promotion to Lieutenant Colonel

in December of that year. It is believed that he received this promotion on schedule, as he was awarded the Order of Lenin in 1962 and subsequently was promoted to his present post as First Deputy Chief of the Seventh Department, SCD, KGB.

[Redacted] Bureau Informant 200 (Hunter Report [Redacted] advised in 11-61 that the subject (born 3-22-32 at NYC) had been approached to run guns for Fidel Castro; however, the subject did not run guns for him. We have been trying to arrange an interview with subject since we opened case in 11-61 but subject was then serving as [Redacted] in Warsaw, Poland, and was not expected to return until 1963. 1. In addition to radio and TV reports of 9 February and articles
appearing in the press 10 February, the following information as released
this date by UPI is provided:

Washington--A staff officer of the Soviet Secret Police,
stationed in Geneva, has asked for political asylum in
the United States, the State Department said today.

He was identified as Yuri Ivanovich NOSSENKO, 36,
a member of Russia's Disarmament Conference Delegation
in Geneva. He dropped out of sight there six days ago.

The State Department would not reveal his present
whereabouts.

State Department press officer, Richard I. Phillips,
told newsmen NOSSENKO asked for political asylum in
the United States prior to 5 February, the date of his
scheduled recall from his Geneva assignment. "According
to his statements to us," Phillips said, "He is a staff
officer of the KGB. The KGB is the abbreviated term for
Russia's Committee for State Security.

Phillips said that until 4 February NOSSENKO was
assigned in Geneva on temporary duty from KGB head-
quarters in Moscow.

Soviet officials disclosed yesterday that NOSSENKO,
whom they listed as a disarmament "expert" had been
missing for five days. He had been carried as a member
of Russia's Delegation to the 17-Nation Disarmament Con-
ference which reconvened in Geneva 21 January.

The State Department declined to give any further details, such as how or where NOSSENKO made contact with U.S. officials. Phillips indicates his request for political asylum is under consideration.

NOSSENKO, according to the State Department, was born in Nikolayev, Russia.

Phillips said that NOSSENKO asked for American sanctuary "prior to his recall which was scheduled for 5 February." In response to questions, however, the U.S. spokesman declined to say what the United States knew about NOSSENKO's activities in Geneva, how he asked for asylum, where he is now, or whether the request will be granted. Phillips turned aside questions with the statement that he could provide no further information.

NOSSENKO arrived in Geneva 20 January. Disarmament Conference documents listed him as an expert without saying his particular field.

Informed sources said NOSSENKO is married and has two children. His family lives in Russia, apparently in Moscow.

A Geneva afternoon newspaper, the "Tribune de Geneva," claimed that NOSSENKO also had access relating not only to Conference strategy but also to Soviet defense potential. This claim could not be substantiated in any way.

Swissair, the National Swiss Airline, said meanwhile it had nobody named NOSSENKO on its flight from Geneva to Paris either Friday or Saturday.

It had been reported that NOSSENKO flew to the French capital on one of those two days, although one report said he left from Zurich. Soviet spokesmen, meanwhile, declined to give any detailed information.

In Geneva, Soviet sources said NOSSENKO was a legal expert of the Soviet Foreign Ministry, and specialized in disarmament for several years. Thus, he had access to Soviet defense secrets and negotiating plans for the Disarmament Conference which resumed its talks in Geneva 21 January.

It was believed in Geneva that NOSSENKO's information could be of immense value to Western disarmament negotiators and defense strategists. But his defection also could harden the Soviet position in the 2-year-old Conference.

Swiss officials said NOSSENKO crossed into France 4 February by way of one of the many crossing points near Geneva with his diplomatic passport. They said this aroused no suspicions or special interest.

In Paris, French police said they knew nothing of NOSSENKO's whereabouts.

NOSSENKO lived with about 10 other Soviet Delegation members in a small hotel on Avenue Wendt in the Servette District of Geneva. On 4 February, the day of his disappearance, the Russians all packed their belongings and moved to the Delegation Headquarters.

There was speculation that NOSSENKO chose this particular day for his departure because the general move allowed him to take his belongings out of the hotel without arousing suspicion.

2. Confirming my telephone conversation of 10 February, Subject is being handled as a special case in accordance with the USIB Agreement of 1 August 1962 (USIB-M-227).

3. Maximum security is being exercised in the handling of Subject and it is requested that all addressees treat information in paragraph 2 above on a strict need-to-know basis.

There is attached one copy of CIA letter dated 1/7/64 furnishing information received from Yuri Nosenko, Soviet defector whose bona fides has not been established. You will note that Nosenko advised that one [Redacted] American citizen, had supplied information to the KGB while he was in Moscow, but that he had refused to work for the KGB while in the United States. This probably refers to the subject.

You should review the instant file and prepare a report suitable for dissemination including the complete details concerning the subject's procommunist activities, his employments and travels abroad. You should check with the Immigration and Naturalization Service to determine if the subject is still in Moscow. You should also conduct investigation to determine if the subject has been active as a Soviet illegal agent while in the United States.

WFO should review the files of the State Department for information concerning the status of the subject's passport. In view of the above allegation, all correspondence should be captioned as above.

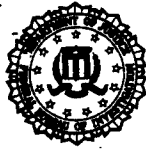

Informant advised that he does not know YURI I. NOSSENKO, who defected to the US at Geneva, Switzerland, recently. He stated that he had heard that there was great concern [redacted] over this defection and this action has resulted in heavy criticism by the Central Committee of the Communist Party (CP) in Moscow. He stated that it is probable that Moscow will retaliate by arresting one or two Americans on an espionage charge and will have a "show trial" for publicity purposes. He stated that he did not think that the Soviet Government would immediately return, to the Soviet Union, those Soviet nationals in the US who knew NOSSENKO. It was his belief that these individuals might perhaps be returned to the Soviet Union in a few months. He stated that it is also his belief that all Soviet nationals outside the Soviet Union will be put under tighter discipline as a result of this defection and that there will be a meeting of all Soviet nationals [redacted] urging greater vigilance in this regard.

Subject is the KGB officer who allegedly defected to CIA in Switzerland. The agency is continuing its interrogation in Germany but it is anticipated that the subject may be moved to the U. S. in the very near future. In this connection, James Angleton, CIA, advised Liaison Agent on 2/10/64, that the Soviets may demand to have access to subject. If so, CIA prefers to have subject in the U. S. if and when such a demand is made.

You previously have been informed that CIA has doubts regarding subject's bona fides. This skepticism, which continues, is predicated on the following:

(1) Subject claims Soviets currently do not have any microphones in the American Embassy, Moscow. His story is that during some building reconstruction which took place at the Embassy a few months ago, the KGB "goofed" and failed to make certain microphones operationally active. CIA finds it difficult to accept this story.

(2) Subject claims KGB currently has no penetration within CIA. This differs very strongly with information furnished by Anatoliy Golitzyn.

(3) Much of the information volunteered by subject so far is already known and he has not given any new information of unusual significance.

(4) During the interrogation, he speaks very freely and with ease concerning matters of relatively minor importance. When questioned concerning sensitive items regarding KGB operations, he refers to notes.

(6) Much of subject's information is almost identical with that furnished to [REDACTED]

[REDACTED] If this is true, then it suggests that Nosenko is also a plant.

(7) A CIA official returned from Germany on 2/10/64, after carefully analyzing information received so far and after conferring with CIA interrogators. He has reported that in his opinion subject is not being truthful.

Working on the assumption that subject is a plant, CIA is speculating the KGB is maneuvering to make some type of damaging strike. The agency definitely has the jitters although the officials state they are looking at everything with an open mind. There is no doubt that much of CIA's concern is predicated on the influence of Golitzyn. CIA maintains that nobody has ever developed any evidence indicating that Golitzyn's information has proved to be wrong. CIA does admit that Golitzyn's theorizing on KGB motives and objectives can be questioned but CIA maintains he does not furnish his theories as facts but offers them for what they are worth.

The above-described jitters are aggravated by recent developments in France; there has been interesting chain of unexplained events more or less coinciding with subject's defection.

[REDACTED] CIA has been reliably informed (S) that Oleg Grubonov, the head of the Second Chief Directorate (counter-intelligence) of the KGB, is in Paris with the aforementioned delegation. He is using the name of Grubonov. Another member of this delegation using another name is Vera Andreyeva, an official of considerable stature in KGB. CIA has also learned that the delegation includes an individual named Kovchuk, whom Golitzyn has identified as KGB officer. (S)

Nosenko has told CIA that Grubonov is one of his old friends. Grubonov is also well known to [REDACTED]. Question is raised why the KGB would permit Grubonov to travel to Paris under an assumed name when both Nosenko and [REDACTED] are aware of his identity. They do know that he has used the name Grubonov in his travels. (S)

After reading the newspapers on 2/10/64, Golitzyn volunteered the following to CIA. He is quite certain that he remembers Nosenko. He characterizes him as an officer at the working level who should possess considerable information concerning many cases. He expressed the opinion that it would be highly unusual for the KGB to send a man from the Second Directorate to the Disarmament Conference. Since this appears to be contrary to general policy, he commented that the KGB must be planning something of an unusual nature. (S)

They advised it is their current intention to keep these doubts tightly held within the Agency and they asked that we do so within the Bureau. *Note*

CIA has not disseminated any Nosenko information to any agency other than the Bureau. They have asked that we not disseminate without consultation with them. CIA points out that so much of Nosenko's information comes within the Bureau's jurisdiction that what we develop will be of great importance in eventually determining his bona fides.

Observations re CIA's Analysis

CIA has been the only one dealing with Nosenko and they seem firmly convinced that he is a plant. However, Anatoliy Golitzyn has played a large part in influencing CIA's analysis. While we must recognize CIA's analysis has merit and may be correct, we should let the facts speak for themselves and should obtain whatever information Nosenko has and then conduct a proper investigation and thereafter come to our own conclusions as to his bona fides.
