Pamphlet Case Sentence Given

Lee Oswald, 23, 4907 Magazine, Monday was sentenced to pay a fine of \$10 or serve 10 days in jail on a charge of disturbing the peace by creating a scene.

Oswald was arrested by First District police at 4:15 p. m. Friday in the 700 block of Canal while he was reportedly distributing pamphlets asking for a "Fair Play for Cuba."

Police were called to the scene when three Cubans reportedly sought to stop Oswald. Municipal charges against the Cubans for disturbing the peace were dropped by the court.

On August 9, 1963, LEE HARVEY OSWALD was arrested by the New Orleans Police Department, along with three other persons, on a charge of "Disturbing the Peace." It was determined subsequent to OSWALD's arrest, that he had been distributing pamphlets containing the writing "HANDS OFF CUBA! Join the Fair Play for Cuba Committee, NEW ORLEANS CHARTER MEMBER BRANCH, Free Literature, Lectures, LOCATION: L. N. OSWALD, 4907 Magazine, New Orleans, La., EVERYONE WELCOME!"

On August 16, 1963, two persons, one of which is believed identical with OSWALD, who identified themselves as being connected with the Fair Play for Cuba Committee (FPCC), distributed pamphlets in front of the International Trade Mart in New Orleans. They remained in that location for only a few moments and departed. This latter information was furnished on August 16, 1963, by JESSE CORE, who has a contractual relationship with the International Trade Mart and is a source of information relative to Latin American matters of the New Orleans Office.

New Orleans is reopening instant case for the purpose of determining the identities of members of the New Orleans chapter of subject organization, as well as the nature of the activities of this chapter.

On 12/17/63, the Minneapolis Office received a telephone call from JOHN MARTIN, 1752 Iglehart, Apartment 4, St. Paul, Minn. who advised that he had personally taken 8 mm. moviewes of a group of Cubans just after OSWALD was arrested in New Orleans on 8/9/63. MARTIN said these films would be available to the FBI if desired.

Without viewing film or knowing coverage by New Orleans, this group of Cubans referred to by MARTIN are apparently anti-CASTROITES who were against OSWALD and literature being distributed.

New Orleans advise if this coverage would be of interest and if the use of above film would be of any value to New Orleans.

Mr. RALPH W. DONALDSON, Manager, Express and Baggage Section, Southern Greyhound Bus Lines, 1710 Tulane Avenue, New Orleans, Louisiana, furnished the following information in connection with the handling of baggage and parcels by this Greyhound Baggage Section:

1. Carry-on. Passenger carries his luggage onto the bus without any type of records or form issued by the bus company.
2. Check with Baggage Section - Passenger presents his ticket to baggage handler who will punch ticket in baggage space. A three-part claim check is prepared, with the first and second parts attached to the luggage, and the third part given to the passenger for claim purposes. The second part of the claim check is taken from the luggage by drivers at the station prior to destination, in order to identify luggage that must be released at the next station. This allows a passenger to be able to claim his luggage at any station along the route, if he so designates at the place of origin. However, this does not stop a passenger from claiming his luggage at any time during the trip, as long as a claim check is presented. The first part of the claim check remains with the luggage and has to be removed by the passenger when the luggage is claimed. If a passenger presents a ticket showing travel to a foreign country, such as Mexico, the baggage handler will automatically attach to the luggage a special red tag printed "RUSH RIDER." This tag is attached for service purposes only to identify the luggage as international luggage without the passenger receiving any

part of this tag. When the luggage so identified is delivered to the passenger, this special red "RUSH RIDER" tag is torn in such a fashion as to allow the top part of the tag to remain on the luggage.

No records are retained by the Greyhound Bus Company on luggage shipped by using a passenger's ticket.

3. Express Packages - This is a special express service offered by Greyhound to any one. When a package is presented to the baggage handler for express shipment, he prepares a Greyhound busbill on the designated form either "prepaid" or "collect," depending upon the request of the sender. A passenger holding a ticket cannot use this type of form to ship his luggage to the same destination as shown on the ticket, but he can pay the necessary prepaid fee and send any package to any destination. The busbill is a special form with five parts for each issue. The first part is given to the sender of the package, the second part is sent to the Accounting Section, the third part is destroyed when the fee is paid (if charge customer, the third part is sent to the Accounting Section), the fourth part and fifth part are attached to the package and when the package arrives at its destination, the package handler at the destination removes the fourth part for his records, awaiting the package to be picked up. When person shown as the receiver of the package makes claim, he identifies himself and signs the fourth part of this form. The fifth part remains with the package.

The second part of this form is sent to the Accounting Division, Southern Greyhound Bus Lines, Lexington, Kentucky, for accounting purchases, and the fourth part of the form is evidence of the delivery and is also sent to the Accounting Division in Lexington.

Mr. DONALDSON advised that he also has the responsibility to maintain and keep check on all the lockers in the Greyhound Terminal. He advised there are 200 lockers at the Terminal, each equipped with removable tumbler locks and identified by number. He related the following regarding the administrative handling of these lockers:

A ledger-type book is maintained on these lockers, a "Locker Reading Book" in which a daily record is maintained on the use of all the lockers. Each morning at 10:30 a complete check is made of all lockers to determine if they are in use. If a locker is in use, the meter reading is recorded and if this same meter reading is noted the next morning at 10:30 the tumbler lock is removed and the lock hold plugged with a plug reading "See Agent!" It will be then necessary for the user to contact the ticket agent for release of items therein by paying the additional charge, as there is a fee of 25 cents for each 24 hours. After the first 24 hours, the "See Agent" plug replaces the tumbler lock and remains there for three days. If the user does not return within the three days, the contents of the locker are removed. The contents of a locker are listed, identified with a numbered tag, and then held in a baggage room for 45 days. After the passing of 45 days and if the user still does not return for the luggage, the items are sent to the New Orleans unclaimed warehouse. These materials remain at the unclaimed warehouse for a period of six months, after which time they are disposed of.

Mr. DONALDSON reviewed the Locker Reading Book for the period from 10:30 AM, September 24, 1963 through 10:30 AM, September 26, 1963, and advised that only one locker was opened during this period as an unclaimed locker. The records identified this locker as Locker #408 in use at 10:30 AM on September 24, 1963, and listed the contents as a brown suitcase, which suitcase was placed in storage on September 26, 1963, under Claim Number C 37070, Storage Tag Number 61628.

On November 13, 1963, this luggage was claimed under "Re-forwarded" Tag Number 128592.

Mr. DONALDSON advised there is another service offered by the Greyhound Lines, which is referred to as a "Parcel Check." This service allows anyone to check a package into the baggage room for a short period. The only record made for each parcel is a two-part claim check, one part of the claim check to the customer and the other part on the parcel. If the parcel is not claimed within 45 days, the parcel is sent to the New Orleans warehouse for six months, and if still not claimed, it will be disposed of. Upon checking the record on parcels unclaimed, it was determined that one parcel, described as Type Number 50 on the baggage identification chart furnished by Mr. DONALDSON as having been placed at the warehouse as unclaimed. This parcel had attached Parcel Claim Check Number 126749, however, Mr. DONALDSON advised this could not have been property of OSWALD, since this series of claim check numbers were being used in the latter part of October, 1963.

Mr. DONALDSON viewed a photograph of LEE HARVEY OSWALD and advised he does not recall seeing anyone resembling the person in this photograph at the bus terminal at any time.

Synopsis

ORESTES PENA, New Orleans, La., contacted on 6/3/64 for purpose of interview and declined to be interviewed without his attorney being present. On 6/4/64 CARLOS BRINGUIER, New Orleans, La., advised that first person he talked to connected with the Habana Bar, New Orleans, after assassination of President KENNEDY was ORESTES PENA, the owner. PENA told him that LEE HARVEY OSWALD had been in the Habana Bar with a Latin-appearing person prior to assassination. PENA told BRINGUIER that OSWALD ordered lemonade and argued about the price and afterwards became sick to stomach. BRINGUIER stated he was not sure but believed it was PENA who told him that OSWALD had been in the Habana Bar on approximately the same date that BRINGUIER had trouble with OSWALD on the street in New Orleans. BRINGUIER states it was his recollection that it was either PENA or EVARISTO RODRIGUEZ who had told him that the man who was with OSWALD in the bar had admitted being a Mexican. BRINGUIER states that after conversation with PENA, RODRIGUEZ furnished him the same information regarding OSWALD's visit to the Habana Bar. BRINGUIER advised he later talked with RUPERTO PENA about OSWALD having been in the bar. BRINGUIER related that he was told by RUPERTO that the man who accompanied OSWALD to the bar was identical with one of two men whom RUPERTO had seen passing in an automobile in front of the bar and about whom PENA had previously talked to BRINGUIER. BRINGUIER stated

In an effort to verify CARLOS BRINGUIER's alleged telephone call to the New Orleans Office of the Federal Bureau of Investigation between August 15-30, 1963, all pertinent files were reviewed, however, no record of any such call could be located.

In addition, all references contained in the New Orleans files of the FBI relating to CARLOS BRINGUIER, the Habana Bar, ORESTES PENA and EVARISTO RODRIGUEZ were reviewed, however, no record of any such call could be located.

The records of the New Orleans Office of the FBI contained no information identifiable with RUPERTO PENA.

Date June 18, 1964

1 Mr. JOHN D. TAMBERELLA, 219 Carondelet, Suite 408, (telephone number Jackson 2-4148), Attorney for OREST PENA, Owner of the Habana Bar, 117 Decatur Street, New Orleans, Louisiana, was contacted by telephone at his office at approximately 1:08 PM, June 18, 1964.

Mr. TAMBERELLA advised that he had contacted Mr. OREST PENA, his client, and had advised Mr. PENA of the desires of FBI Agents to reinterview him concerning apparent conflict between information furnished by PENA June 9, 1964 and that which he had furnished to Agents on December 5, 1963. Mr. TAMBERELLA advised that Mr. PENA told him that he did not care to engage in any additional interviews with the Agents of any Government agencies, and that the only way he would be willing to be interviewed would be in response to a subpoena from the Warren Commission. Mr. TAMBERELLA explained that Mr. PENA said he was tired of being interviewed by numerous Government agencies.

It was pointed out to Mr. TAMBERELLA that there were only two points that needed to be clarified by Mr. PENA. It was explained to him that OREST PENA had told FBI Agents DONALD C. STEINMEYER and ROBERT E. LOGAN on December 5, 1963 that LEE HARVEY OSWALD and another man, either Mexican or Cuban, came into his bar sometime during the summer of 1963. Mr. TAMBERELLA also was reminded that on June 9, 1964, in the presence of Mr. TAMBERELLA, Mr. PENA had said specifically that he never told anyone, including CARLOS BRINGUIER, that OSWALD had been in the Habana Bar with a Mexican prior to the assassination of President KENNEDY. Mr. TAMBERELLA stated that he did not feel that this latter statement was contradictory to the former in that it was TAMBERELLA's appreciation that PENA meant that he had not told any "lay people" (that is other than a law enforcement officer such as the FBI) that OSWALD had been in the Habana Bar with a Mexican prior to the assassination of President KENNEDY. Mr. TAMBERELLA stated that it was his appreciation that Mr. PENA had explained all details regarding the alleged visit to the Habana Bar of OSWALD when PENA was interviewed on June 9, 1964.

Mr. TAMBERELLA was asked if he would be willing, nevertheless, to recontact PENA and ascertain if he were

willing to clarify the apparent discrepancy between his statement made on December 5, 1963 to FBI Agents, namely: "... that LEE HARVEY OSWALD and another man, either Mexican or Cuban, came into his bar sometime during the summer of 1963." and the statement made by him on June 9, 1964 to FBI Agents in the presence of Attorney TAMBERELLA, namely, "... he never told anyone, including CARLOS BRINGUIER, that OSWALD had been in the Habana Bar with a Mexican prior to the assassination of President KENNEDY."

Mr. TAMBERELLA stated that he would endeavor to contact PENA on June 18, 1964 or June 19, 1964, and determine if PENA is willing to at least clarify the above apparent discrepancy.

It was suggested to Mr. TAMBERELLA that perhaps FBI Agents could put this question to Mr. PENA directly. Mr. TAMBERELLA stated that Mr. PENA said he did not want to speak to FBI Agents and that he, TAMBERELLA, would object to attempts being made by FBI Agents to contact PENA directly.

Mr. TAMBERELLA was requested to ask Mr. PENA again to make available his passport for perusal by FBI Agents in order that the dates of his foreign travel may be determined as those dates, particularly travel in August, 1963, are pertinent to the investigation concerning the time when the party believed to be OSWALD was allegedly in the Habana Bar. Mr. TAMBERELLA stated that there would be no point in his recontacting PENA regarding this, as PENA was very firm in his statement that when he, PENA, was traveling abroad, his passport was reviewed by Immigration and Naturalization Service both at the time of his departure and at the time of his return to the United States from abroad, at which times his passport was found to be in order. He stated that PENA was unwilling to make his passport available for review by FBI Agents whatever the reason may be.

Mr. TAMBERELLA then stated that he would contact Mr. PENA on June 18 or June 19 as stated previously, and that he would advise SA WARREN C. DE BRUEYS of the results of his request made to Mr. PENA at the latest by June 19, 1964.

after the test drive OSWALD had said he would be back in
about two weeks and would be able to pay cash for the car.
Mrs. BOGARD further told [redacted] that BOGARD informed
her he had been questioned by the FBI about this in Dallas,
Texas. Mrs. BOGARD did not tell [redacted] when BOGARD had
told her about this.

[redacted] stated Mrs. BOGARD told him AL
BOGARD was in jail in Dallas for hot checks in connection
with leasing an automobile, and was to go to trial soon.
Mrs. BOGARD also told [redacted] she had been telephonically
contacted by a news reporter who identified herself as

70 Mrs. CAMPBELL, telephone LT 1-3680, New York City, on 10/18/64, who said she was going to BOGARD's trial. [redacted] did not learn the reason why this reporter was going to the trial.

70 [redacted] stated AL BOGARD's parents, Mr. and Mrs. A. T. BOGARD, live in Coushatta. He stated he had no knowledge regarding the recent activities of BOGARD, is not personally acquainted with him, and does not know if BOGARD was in fact in the Shreveport area during the early part of August, 1964.

72 On 11/6/64, a photograph of BOGARD was shown by SA DONALD R. BELMONT, among other photos, to [redacted] and [redacted] witnesses in New Orleans case captioned "UNSUB (1); Bossier Bank & Trust Co., North Bossier Branch, Bossier City, La., 7/23/64, BR," (New Orleans file 91-2296). Both stated they saw no resemblance to the UNSUB of that case. [redacted] said he recognized the photo of BOGARD, as he has known him in the past, but has not seen BOGARD since about 1957. He stated BOGARD formerly worked for Central Motors, Shreveport, La., and he stated he believed BOGARD had an account in that bank at one time, years ago. He had no knowledge of BOGARD's recent activities.

The above information is being furnished for the information of the Dallas Office. Inasmuch as Dallas has advised BOGARD has been previously questioned by the Dallas Office regarding the OSWALD investigation, it is presumed it was in connection with what he told his ex-wife, and therefore, no lead is being set forth to re-interview him regarding this matter. No further investigation is being conducted by the New Orleans Office.

Good Journalism

Instead of going to town with a sensation story, or phony "crusade," *Look Magazine* has done a good turn for journalism in general by giving rein to the analytic talents of Fletcher Knebel, a writer who believes apparently in taking second or third looks at material that is superficially "spicy."

The Knebel article deals with a new attack, in book form, on the conclusions of the Warren Commission in respect to the "lone operator" role of the assassin of President Kennedy. The attack would indicate, among other things, that the original autopsy report was wrongfully altered and falsified. However easy it might be for a researcher among documents to leap to such a conclusion, Mr. Knebel shows that with a little more such research, and a little independent contact with persons, the author could have satisfied himself of the autopsy-report's essential validity.

Though this particular angle of attack, it seems to us, has previously been exploited and exploded, it is valuable in many ways that it, and other "exposures" dealt with, be given the thorough-going treatment here accorded. A little more dissection of "charges" of various kinds, a little more impartial digging beneath the surface of "promising" scandals, would do the entire body politic a world of good.

As for the Kennedy assassination, the publishing course adopted promised to present the whole-truth-and-nothing-but in a way that could "satisfy the ages." It already has become apparent, however, that the main body of the Warren Report, for whatever reason, is not

quite up to the mark of spiking every false clue in such a way that any reader, consulting the index, can find his own answer to any question raised that has any significance. A little expansion of content; an expansion of the index; foot notes illuminating apparent contradictions, and errors, would improve it greatly as the "little man's reference work."

If the volume is to have repeated editions, it would be well to revise it so as to make unnecessary the kind of "research-researching" Mr. Knebel had to do. Otherwise, we can look forward from year to year to "ghost stories" about the Kennedy case, as consistently as to scare yarns about the flying saucers

Oswald's Mother Files Libel Suits

FORTH WORTH, Tex. (AP)—Five libel suits for \$5 million each were filed yesterday by the mother of accused presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald against a congressman and several writers and publishers.

In the federal court suits Marguerite Oswald claims the defendants made false and misleading statements about her and her son, who was named by the Warren Commission as the rifleman who shot President John F. Kennedy.

One petition names Rep. Gerald R. Ford, R-Mich., along with John R. Stiles and Simon & Schuster Inc. Ford was a member of the Warren Commission and wrote a book about its probe of the Kennedy assassination Nov. 22, 1963, in Dallas.

The other four libel suits are against these persons and groups associated with books or magazine articles about the assassination:

—Jim Bishop and Funk & Wagnall Co.

—Stephen White, the McMillan Publishing Co. and Columbia Broadcasting System.

—Jimmy Breslin and the New York Magazine Co.

—William Manchester, Harper & Row Publishers Inc., and Cowles Communications Inc.

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Court Awards Oswald Widow \$17,729 for His Personal Effects

The U.S. Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals held Monday that the government should pay the wife of accused Presidential assassin Lee Harvey Oswald \$17,729.37 for certain of Oswald's personal effects which were seized.

In deciding the amount of the award, the appeals court upset a lower court ruling which concluded that just compensation for Mrs. Marina N. Oswald Porter was \$3,000.

The decision of the appeals court agreed with a determination by a special master who determined that \$17,729.37 was the fair market value of the items which consisted of letters, a diary, family photographs, a marriage license and the contents of Oswald's wallet.

The \$3,000 figure was arrived at by the lower court in Texas after stipulations by attorneys for Mrs. Porter and the Justice Department as the fair amount for similar items not enhanced in value because of their worth to collectors.

In the decision, the appeals court turned down claims by Mrs. Porter for compensation for damage done to the documents by the Federal Bureau of Investigation during examination and for alleged diminution in the value of the documents because of their publication in the Warren Commission Report.
