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ALBERT E. JKNNER of the Warren Commission, ally contacted the New Orleans Office at 12:05 p.m., 4/8/64, and advised he had been ta the Louisiana Division of Unemployment Security to check on the applications filed by LBE HARVEY OSWALD and to interview persons there concerning their knowledge of OSWALD. He advisedhemes informed humen individual whom he believed to be forms they had, had been turned over to the FBI and they had no forms of OSWALD in their files.

JENNBR advised that he could not conduct his interviews without having the information available from these forms and inquired as to whether or not this office still had instant forms.

A check of the report of SA. TARRRN_C. DE BRURYS dated 12/2/63 reflects that NO T-6 Orleans Division of Rmployment Security, Wiich is reported on pages 82 and 83 of instant report, made available information concerning OSWALD and also furnished all forms referred to in the information he furnished.

The bulky exhibit reflects instant forms, which vere in file 89-69 and were obtained on $11 / 27 / 63$, had been sent to the Bureau on 2/4/64.

A letter in pile 100-16601, serial 552, sets forth the forwarding of these forms to the Lab.

A letter from the Director to Dallas dated 2/11/64 made reference to New Orleans letter and forwarded four photographic copies of instant exhibits to the Dallas Office, no copies to New Orleans, and originals not mentioned in instant letter. The letter advised Dallas to determine whether investigative report had been subinitted for these items and if 80 , ghould prepare a letterhead memo suitable for dissemination,

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Identifying the report in which the pertinent information wán bet forth, and attaching three of the photographs as exhibits. If an investigative report has not been submitted, to subait same, attaching two photographs to the two copies of the report designated for the President's Comission, and the third copy should bear the SAC's initials.

I discussed the above with DON MOORE of the Bureau, advising him of the request of JENNRR and what our ilie shows, and advised him that based on the information in our files we were going to advise JBNNER that we did not have the copies of their forms from kmployment Security, that they had been forwarded to Washington.

I inquired as to what our answer vould be in reference to a request as to what was told us which was contained on pages 82 and 83 of DR BRURYS' report and whether we could furnish this information to JENNER and he advised we could and that we should also point out that report and copies of these sit. documents had been furnished to the Comission.

To double check on the above, I telephonically contacted Dallas and talked to ASAC CLARX and requested he advise me as to what their illes show as to when any report was sent to go to the Comisision in reference to the Employment forms. Ee advised he would check this and call me back.

ASAC CLARK advised that exhibits starting with D115 as furnished by the Bureau came from the Loulsiana Division of Employment Security, vere forwarded by letterhead memo by the Dallas Office 2/28/64.

JENNBR was telephonically contacted at 2:31 p.m. and advised this office did not have the forms he was requesting or copies of them and that copies of them had been forvarded to the Comission. He advised he would review these when in Washington on 4/9/64 and then would return to New Orleans next
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## Memorandum

At 3:22 pom., Mr. W. A. BRANIGAN of the Bureau called. He advised Bureau was in receipt of telephone call from Ur. JAMES LIEBLER, representing the President's Commission, who indicated that while in New Orleans, LIRBLER had interviewed CARLOS BRINGUIERE and that BRINGUIERE told him that sometime prior to the assassination of the president that someone from the FBI had made inquiries concerning a Mexican in the Habana Bar. The name of this Mexican was not furnished by BRINGUIERE to LIEBLER. BRINGUIRRE also indicated that the same Mexican had subsequently been seen in an automobile riding with another Mexican and that later the above Mexican in question had been in the Habana Bar with OSWALD at the time OSWALD allegedly ordered a lemonade.

Mr. BRANIGAN stated Mr. LIEBLER desired to know what action the FBI was taking to check out this information. BRANIGAN further advised that the only references he could find to this situation were in report of $12 / 2 / 63$ of SA deBRUBYS on page 696 and report of SA REYNOLDS, $12 / 6 / 63$, which contains an interview with ORESTA PENA.

I advised BRANIGAN as far as i could recall the unknown Mexican hadnever been identified but at least one additional inquiry had been made at the Habana Bar by SA LOGAN, results of which BRANIGAN apparently did not have. I also pointed out to BRANIGAN there is some question as to BRINGUIERE's reliability and also PENA's reliability and that prior to making additional inquiries it appeared desirable to have whatever comments BRINGUIERE may have made in any deposition he furnished to LIEBLER.

BRANIGAN stated he was inclined to agree with this but requested that an airtel be submitted setting forth the reports and page numbers in which any interviews dealing with this matter are located.
