On April 11, 1968, an examination was made of a 1966 Ford Mustang at the FBI Garage in Atlanta, Georgia.

This vehicle was a two-door 289, eight-cylinder, 2-barrel carburetor, color white, hardtop, bearing 1968 Alabama license 1-38993. The mileage was noted as 39100.8. The Serial number was 6TO7C190647, the body 65A, the color H, the trim 25, date 17A, DFSO 21. The serial number, body number, terminal date and DPSO were noted on the serial plate affixed to the left door. Also affixed to the left door was an RPM sticker H. BECKMAN Chevron Service, 1506 North Normandy Avenue, Los Angeles, California, Telephone #666-9921. The sticker reflected oil was drained 2/13/68, wheel bearings were checked at 34185 miles, wheels were aligned at this same mileage.

A Gulf Pride sticker was also affixed at this same location with so address or company rame listed; however, milegge was noted on this sticker as 20253 and the only portion of date was 187".

On the left door post was noted an RPM observes sticker PAN-POX FORD, 4531 Hollywood Boulevard, Hollywood, California, Teleptions 5-1131, reflecting service ciled at mileage 34290, all filtered at some mileage.

On the left rear trunk lid was a metal insignia "Maring Bord".

The right rear window bore a sticker "Direction Centual de Registro Federal de Automoviles, 1967 Outbre Turista, Aduana de Nelvo, Laredo, Tam." (rest of sticker torn).

This same sticker was also affixed to the right front winishield, lower right side, and it bore Folio #H294486. The last word which was torn on the other sticker is reflected on the second sticker as Tamps.

The battery was a Sears All-State high voltage (12 volt 54 plates). Valor the negative terminal was a bright motal plate imprinted C8. On the engine side of the battery there was a waits tape about the size of a nickel stuck on the battery, also showing the notation C-8.

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Mrs. ESTELLE PETERS, Manager, Piedmont Laundry, Pick-Up Station, 1168 Peachtree, Northeast, home residence Clarkston, Georgia, home telephone number, business telephone number 892-1467, advised that on April 1, 1968 shortly before 10 a.m. a white male came into the laundry and placed four undershirts, three underdrawers, one pair of socks, one wash cloth, as well as dry cleaning consisting of one pair of trousers, one coat and one tie and gave her the name ERIC GALT. She stated that she asked him if he spelled ERIC as ERIC and he replied yes and proceeded to spell his last name as GALT.

Mrs. PETERS described the dry cleaning and the coat as being a black checked coat with small check blocks and being an ordinary man's suit coat. She said it was not a sport coat or blazer, but an ordinary suit coat.

She described the trousers as a gray on the darker side and the tie as being black with tan and brown diagonal stripes.

She stated that GAIT told her that he did not want any starch in his laundry and wanted the laundry folded.

An artist's sketch of GALT was exhibited to Mrs. PETERS and she advised that she could not say whether or not the sketch resembled GALT. She said she would not be in a position to state whether she could identify GALT if she were to see him again.

Mrs. PETERS continued that she recalled GALT as being in his thirties and slightly taller than Special Agent. who is six feet in height and approximately the same weight as Special Agents and whose weights are approximately 185 pounds.

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complexion. She failed to notice any particular regional accent and did not notice any peculiar marks or clothing characteristics. She did not recall his attire at the time the laundry and dry cleaning.was placed April 1, 1968.

Mrs. PETERS advised from her ledger maintained by her in the usual course of business, the laundry and dry cleaning of GALT was picked up between 9 and 10 a.m. possibly closer to 9 a.m., on April 5, 1968 by the same individual who placed the laundry on April 1, 1968. She did recall that he was one of the earlier customers in the day and was of the opinion that he picked the laundry up earlier than he deposited the cleaning and laundry. To the best of her recollection, GALT entered the laundry and stated that he was there to pick up the laundry and cleaning of ERIC GALT.

At the time he obtained the completed laundry and dry cleaning, he was abrupt and short in his manner of speech giving her the impression that he was in a hurry or had a car parked in an area where he should not have parked. He appeared impatient while waiting for her to locate his laundry and cleaning. GALT paid for the laundry and deaning in cash and she was of the opinion that he walked North on Peachtree Street toward Fourteenth Street after leaving the Laundry. She was unable to furnish his mode of dress on April 5, 1958 other than to stated that he did appear to be well shaven and neatly attired. Mrs. PETERS explained that the only area visible to her on Peachtree Street has prohibited parking and that his car, if he had one, would not have been parked immediately in front of the Laundry. Both times GALT was observed he appeared to be alone and she did not associate any other person with GALT. not obtain the impression that GAIT was depositing cleaning and laundry for anyone other than himself although she did not axign or mark the laundry. She did assign the dry cleaning

items and was of the opinion that they would have been his clothing.

Mrs. PETERS produced a laundry slip from her transactions of April 5, 1968 indicating that ERIC GALT on April 1, 1968 deposited nine items of laundry described as three drawers, four undershirts, one pair of socks and one wash cloth. The notation appeared on the laundry slip "No Starch and Folded", indicating that the laundry would have been placed in a small rectangular stapled package. The laundry mark EGC83 would have been affixed in indelible black pencil in all the laundry items at the main plant of the Piedmont Laundry prior to laundaring. She explained that the EG would indicate the customer as ERIC GALT and the C83 is the designation for her pid-up station. addition, the laundry slip indicates the marker as A Lot 10 which she explained as being the laundry designation and the lot number. A 19-30 appears on the laundry slip and she explained this as meaning the ledger and entry number utilized by her in her bookkeeping system. The total amount of the laundry was \$1.16.

In addition, she furnished a green dry cleaning slip dated April 1, 1958 bearing the name ERIC GALT which has the dry cleaning tag 8 over 755 stapled to the slip. She explained that this tag 8 over 755 would have been placed in each dry cleaning item by staples and this is the Laundry's designation to identify the dry cleaning. The dry cleaning slip reflects one coat, black check; one pair of trousers, gray and one tie, black with tan and brown stripes were deposited on April and claimed on April 5, 1968 by GALT at a total cost of \$1.55.

Mrs. PETERS furnished the above described laundry and dry cleaning slips indicating they were prepared by her April 1, 1968.

Mrs. PETERS explained that no laundry slips are issued to the customer by the laundry and the laundry and the customer would not have been issued a slip to claim his laundry

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and dry cleaning as all of these items are handled by the laundry personnel only.

Mrs. PETERS recalled that GALT made no other remarks or any conversation giving her any other impression. She had no recollection of any prior transactions with GALT.

JHIME DELTON GARIER, 107 - 14th Street, N.E., Atlanta, Georgia, was contacted at 10:37 P.H., April 14, 1963, at which time he furnished the following information:

GARMER made available a record book maintained by him concerning persons who rent rooms at both 107 and 113 - 14th Street, N.J., rooming houses operated by him on a loase basis. A roview of this record book failed to disclose any registration in the name GALT. It should be noted this book contains only a record of records for the period beginning January 1,1933.

Upon being questioned concorning individuals renting at these addresses who night have checked out prior to the complotion of the period for whim they bad paid, or others who for any reason adght not be reserted in this record book, Girilli named, among others, an individual named (First Name Un'incung CALT. On boing quostioned concerning GALT, he said this individual was first soon by him on the afternoon of April 5, 1888, between the hours of 5:00 and 6:00 D.I. complained! that another recent, MAD C. JOIDS, who occupies room #1 at 113 - 14th Otreet, H.T., had been sitting in front of this building and was appreached by Gala, who inquired concerning the availability of a room. GARIER joined the pair and GALT indicated to GARRAR he was interested in obtaining a single, quiet room. Having no such room available, GARTER told GALA he would put him in Room 45, at 107 - 14th Street, which room was a double room and that he would be moved to a single room as soon as one became available. GARMER said he noted GAME was driving a block car, probably a Ford, bearing an cut-of-state licerso plate (state of registration not rocalled), and that the car was possibly a 1932 or 1933 model.

GALT accepted this arrangement and paid GAMIDE while outside the dwelling and he believes he received a \$10 hill and a \$1 hill in payment. The cost of the room was \$10.50 per week and a \$.50 key deposit. During the conversation, GALT indicated he was a welder and originally came from The Carolinus." He explained that he had a tag for a different state on the Ford, because he had been working in another state.

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At this point GARMER indicated that possibly the 'tag' on the Ford was a Tennessee tag, but he was not at all certain of this.

GARNER described GALTSas being a white male, 32 - 35 years of age, 5' 11", 100 pounds, dark brown or black hair worn in a brush cut, blue eyes, medium "outdoor" ecuplexion and having a southern accent. He noted no distinguishing features or characteristics and had no recollection of any ring or other jewelry. His dress was casual, specifically described as a shirt and slacks.

GALT noved into Boom #5 at 107 - 14th Street, N.E., where he remained until Bundey, April 7, 1933. On this day GALT was noved to Boom #5 at 133 - 14th Street, H.D. On this occasion, GARRIER observed CLEE move his persessions and noted that he had no luggage and all of his persessions were either moved in a paper bag or box.

On April 7, 1988, MARGAD G. ANDRESS, an employee of the Albert Pick Motel, 18th and Spring Streets, N.N., Atlanta, was brought to the receing house by TITO C. JUNES, who is also employed by this hotel. GARLER assigned AMBERSON Room #2 at 113 - 14th Street, N.R., and noted that the individual he believed to be GART and AMBERSON became friendly.

On April 9, 1968, at approximately 9:00 P.H., CAIM and ANDERSON come to CAMMER's room at 107 - 14th Street, N.E., at which time GALT advised GAMMER that both he and ANDERSON were checking out. He said both non appeared to have been drinking. During the conversation, CAUT advised he had received a telephone call from a friend in Michigan and had learned that welders were receiving a higher heurly wags there. For this reason, he had decided to go to Michigan to sack work. ANDERSON, who was a notel employee, indicated he was goly to Michigan with GALT and hoped to obtain employment as a welder's helper. GARMER recalled he refunded approximately GLY to ANDERSON, who had paid two weeks in advance on registering on April 7. GAMMER did not ack for a refund, although he was paid through April 11, but did receive the return of his \$150 deposit for the key.

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Thereafter, GARMER accompanied GALT and AMDERSON to AMDERSON's room where he secured the room keys from both CALT and AMDERSON. At this time he noted several beer bottles in the room and presumed CALT and AMDERSON had been drinking together. GARMER did not actually observe the departure of GALT and AMDERSON, but noted both were gone on the morning of April 10, 1968, as was the previously-described block Ford auto.

GAMMER made available the registration for HAROLD G. ANDERSON. This registration does not reflect an address for ANDERSON, but indicates that his father is telephone number CARMER emplained that he always attempts to obtain the name and address for a next of him for his roomers.

GARMER identified other tenants who resided at 113 - 14th Street, N.E., during the same period that GALT was a recover there.

GARMER said he was unable to recall GALT's first name, but advised he had observed mail on the hall table of the rooming house at 113 - 14th Street, N.E., which mail was

addressed to GALT. At this point, GARNER accompanied the interviewing Agents to 113 - 14th Street, N.E., where it was observed that there were two letters and a package on the hall table addressed to ERIC S. or E. GALT. The package was postmarked 4/1/03, and the letters were postmarked 4/9 and 4/10/03. GARNER advised his sister, RODBIE LED CARNER.

either Friday or Saturday night, April 12 or 13, 1968. At
this time his sister had thurbed through the mail on the
table at the 113 - 14th Street address and upon noticing the
mail addressed to ENIC CANT, she commented to CAMMER that
this was the same name as the individual who, according to
newspaper publicity, was a suspect in the nurder of Dr. MARTH
any likelihood that the CAMMER stated that he did not feel there was
ILE., was identical with this suspect, stating many people
have the same name.

GARREN stated that he had neither seen nor heard of GALT prior to April 5, 1003, and that during CALT's day at his recaing house he saw nothing to indicate that CALM had any connection with any other tenant at this address prior to his arrival there. GARREN was asked whether he had any explanation for the fact that CALT had mail postmarked 4/1/68 addressed to him at 113 - 14th Street, N.E., and according to CARREN, GALT did not arrive at this location until April 5, 1963. CALT said he was unable to explain this, and had no idea how this could occur.

GAMMER was also questioned concerning the possibility that GALT or any other rectars had left naterial with him in storage or for safekeeping. He assured that this was not so. He did report that Rooms #4 and #5 at 113 - 14th Street, N.E., both of which it was noted were fastened with heaps and padicals, were storage rooms. He stated they contained only linear and possibly a few items of no value left behind by roomers.

With regard to Room #5 at 107 - 14th Street, N.E., GARMER said that this room had not been occupied by anyone since CALT was transferred from this room on April 7, 1968. He noted, however, that the maid, PERMY LEE ZACHRY or her helper, identity unknown, would have changed the sheets in Room #5 after GALT was noved.

With regard to Beem #3 at 113 - 14th Street, N.E., this room remained vacant until April 13, 1803, when it was mented to DAVID O'DIMBUL, Eyossett, How York. He described O'DOMIND as a very young man who is also employed at and who was brought to the rooming house by Famb C. Family. He said he does not believe this room was made up prior to its being rested to O'DOMINGL, but advised he had given O'DEMALL clean sheets so that he could change the liness himself.

CANNER said he did not know of any association between CALL and other recuers at either of the require houses except the association with MANOLD G. AMMERICAN, as previously described.

In explanation for the failure of the name "GALT" to appear on the recaing house records, CAMIDE said that he can only explain this by saying he received payment for the room while away from the place where he maintains his records and had inadvertently failed to record the name when he returned to his room.

The interview of GARMUR concluded at 1:38 AM, April 15, 1838.

In response to a telephonic request received at 9:31 a.m. from JEDIE RELTON GARNER, he was interviewed in front of his restaurant located at 1052 Northside Drive, Northwest, Atlanta, Georgia.

"Lee is not Galt." He then made available the registration records for his rooming house. It was again noted these records do not reflect a registration in the name of GALT. At the same time, GARNER produced an envelope bearing the printed name "Drie S. Calt." CARNER said this name was printed thereon by GALT when GARNER requested his full name. Other handwritten notations thereon were, according to GARNER, prepared by himself.

GARMER stated that subsequent to a prior interview, he had been scarching his records and his memory and had now determined that on March 24, 1958, late in the evening, an individual knocked on his apartment door, introduced hisself as Mr. GALT, and requested a single room.

He was placed in Room Number 2, 113 14th Street, Northeast, Atlanta, Georgia, on noting that the room was small, was offered an adjoining storage room in which to place his surplus belongings. At this point, GLLT remarked he would be able to utilize a desk in the storage room for his television set.

GARNER did not see GALT unload his automobile or bring his pessessions into the room. He next saw GALT on Narch 31, 1988, at which time the rent was due and GALT made the statement, "I may as well pay you for another week." This was between 1:00 and 2:30 p.m.

On April 5; 1960, CARRER entered the room at approximately 11:00 a.m. to change the linens. At this time, he found a note on the bed written on a piece of cardboard, believed by the to be a loundry whirt backing, which stated in effect "I've had to go to Ilraingham.

I've left my TV set here and will try to return for it in

about a week." He does not recall whether the note was printed or written and destroyed it by throwing it in the trash immediately.

GARNER described GALT as a white male, 33 to 35 years of age, approximately six feet tall, slender build, black hair, worn very short with possibly a part on the side.

GARNER had previously noted GALT to be utilizing a light colored, possibly white, automobile and on the morning of April 15, 1933, telephonically contacted Hr. HAROLD WATERS, Room Number 1, 107 14th Street, Northeast, as this automobile was parked near WATERS, at which time he asked WATERS generally if he recalled the make of car and WATERS advised him it was a late model Nustang, possibly 1935 or 1937.

GARRER estimated his total contact with GARR on both occasions did not exceed one-half hour. He stated on both occasions GAET was neatly dressed in a dark suit, white shirt, and tie. He churacterized him as looking like a preacher.

The inconsistencies in the information previously furnished by GANGER and the foregoing were thoroughly discussed with him and he could attribute it only to "being confused", in that he had erroneously associated the name GALT with the requer, WILGIAM ISE, about whom he had furnished the information.

At this time, CARTER made available a three page manarandum in his handwriting which chronologically acus forth his association with GALT. The envelops previously referred to, furnished by CARTER, on which CART wrote his name, also contained the notation "Could do several different kinds of work." This note was prepared by CARTER.

JIMME DELTON GARNER was interviewed in the office of the Federal Dureau of Investigation, 275 Peachtree Street, Northeast, Atlanta, Gaorgia, after voluntarily accompanying SAS and and from his place of business, 1052 Northside Drive, Northwest, Atlanta, Gaorgia. At this time, GARNER stated that he was aware of the discrepancies in the information furnished by him but insisted it was due solely to the confusion which existed in his mind in erroneously relating the name GALT with his roomer, WILLIAM LEE.

He stated he had no reason for telling the Agents that he had no items in his pessession which belonged to CALT, when, in fact, he was holding a television set, other than the confusion previously referred to.

In determining the individuals in each of the rooming houses operated by him (107 14th Street, Northeast, Atlanta, Georgia) who may have been in a position to observe CALT, he advised that at the time of renting to GALT, there was no other occupant in this building.

He stated he had eleved 113 14th Street on February 11, 1956; after the neighborhood hippies attempted to take it over.

He admitted that he had two double rooms vacant at the time CALT applied for a room and that he had previously rented these for the price of a single room, but GALT insisted on a single room, so he decided to open the other rooming house. He admitted it cost him more to do this than he would receive initially in rent, but that he had been planning to open it, as the other house was filling up.

GALT remained the sole occupant of this building until April 1, 1968, at which time FRED C. JONES was placed in Room Number 1.



GARMER specifically denied that he had previously known GALT, that GALT had been referred to him by anyone, that he had accepted an extra amount of money from GALT for any reason, or that he had any knowledge concerning his present whereabouts.

GARMER stated that he was born and raised in Mississippi, was a member of the Eaptist Church, and was "not a Communist." He denied having any knowledge of the John Birch or other right wing organizations, stating he had joined only one organization which name he could not now recall, but described by him as a civic organization.

He reiterated that it had always been his intention to cooperate with the FBI and that he had, in fact, that morning given the address and telephone number of his restaurant to a roomer, Mr. BURGESS, where he could be reached should GALT return for the television set. He stated he did this so he could immediately notify the FBI of GALT's return.

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FEDERAL JREAU OF INVESTIGATION

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On April 15, 1968, Mr. JAMES D. GARNER, operator of the rooming house located at 113 - Fourteenth Street, N.E., advised that the small room located at the rear of Room No. 2 was utilized by ERIC S. GALT. He said GALT's rent had expired and that GALT had not returned to claim any of his belongings.

GARNER voluntarily unlocked the door to this room and explicitly stated he had no objections to Agents searching this small room off of Room No. 2.

With the consent of GARNER, this room was searched and the removal of the below-listed articles was conducted in GARNER's presence and he observed and identified each item taken.

The following list of articles were taken from the small room as indicated above, from the locations as follows:

Each of these items was identified in order that the items might be forwarded to the Laboratory for examination.

During this search, GARNER observed and identified each article taken.

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
