Dear Mr. Weisberg:

The Federal Bureau of Investigation located two Attorney General documents, totalling three pages, while processing your Freedom of Information Act/Privacy Act request for records pertaining to yourself. The documents were referred to this Office for processing and direct response to you.

I have determined that these documents are appropriate for release with excisions made pursuant to 5 U.S.C. §552(b)(6) and (7)(C). These provisions pertain to information the release of which would constitute a clearly unwarranted invasion of the personal privacy of third parties and to records or information compiled for law enforcement purposes, the release of which could reasonably be expected to constitute an unwarranted invasion of the personal privacy of third parties. This information cannot be the subject of a discretionary release. Excised copies of these documents are enclosed.

Finally, please be advised that the FBI inadvertently referred two additional documents, totalling three pages, to this Office. These documents actually originated with the Criminal Division and were referred in July of 1989 to that component for processing and direct response to you. See 28 C.F.R. §16.4(c) (1988).

If you are dissatisfied with my action on this request, you may appeal from this partial denial by writing to the Co-Director, Office of Information and Privacy, United States Department of Justice, 10th and Constitution Avenue, N.W., Room 7238, Washington, D.C. 20530, within 30 days of your receipt of this letter. Both the letter and the envelope should be clearly marked "Freedom of Information Act Appeal." In the event you are dissatisfied with the results of any such appeal,

judicial review will thereafter be available to you in the United States District Court for the judicial district in which you reside or have your principal place of business, or in the District of Columbia, which is also where the records you seek are located.
