

CUBA SCORES MEXICO ON OSWALD INQUIRY

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WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 — Cuba has accused the Mexican authorities of complicity in a "reactionary plot" to link the regime of Premier Fidel Castro to the assassination of President Kennedy.

The Cuban Foreign Minister, Raul Roa, made the charge in a strongly worded note to the Mexican Government protesting the arrest of an employe of the Cuban consulate in Mexico City.

The consulate employe, Mrs. Silvia Duran, a Mexican citizen, was arrested last Saturday for questioning about a visa application by Lee H. Oswald, the

accused assassin of Mr. Kennedy. Mr. Oswald, who was himself slain while being taken out of the Dallas police headquarters, was known to have applied for visas to Cuba and the Soviet Union while he was visiting Mexico last September.

The Cuban protest charged that the Mexican police had used "coercion and brutality" in questioning Mrs. Duran before releasing her the same night. It said the Cuban Government considered the arrest "a flagrant complicity by members of the Mexican police and those who perfidiously intended to involve our fatherland with the dirty crime."
