

Dow Expresses Gratitude for Aid

**Donations Sent to Mrs. Tippitt
in Dallas Exceed \$50,000**

—Some Still Unaccounted

and her three children now total well above \$50,000, with hundreds of contributions unaccounted.

Mr. Tippitt had a \$5,000 life insurance policy that all Dallas policemen must carry. The police had said earlier that he had no insurance.

Mark D. Eagleton of St. Louis, Mo., donated \$200 to The Dallas Times Herald fund and said that "each of us can afford to make some worthwhile changes in our mental attitude."

"I do not believe we are dealing with a single sectional problem," Mr. Eagleton wrote. "Extremism affects us all to some degree."

The Jack Pines family sent in \$5 and pledged "to combat hatred."

Mrs. Tippitt and her three children, Allen, 14, Brenda, 10,

and Curtis Ray, 4, were overwhelmed by the donations. Mrs. Tippitt said she planned to save a great deal of the money for the children's college education.

One football team, the New York Jets of the American Football League, passed up a free Thanksgiving turkey to contribute about \$400 to the family.

The Philadelphia Eagles and Detroit Lions of the National Football League previously announced that they had collected funds for Mr. Tippitt's survivors.

In Michigan City, Ind., Dennis Heuer and his 17-year-old partner were arrested on charges of illegally soliciting funds. They said that they were collecting the money for Mrs. Tippitt, but the police said this was not so.

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
