

JOHNSON MAY REFUSE TO USE KENNEDY AUTO

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3 (AP)—

The bubble-top limousine in which President John F. Kennedy was assassinated has been flown back to Washington.

Although the 30-month-old luxury vehicle is in perfect condition, President Lyndon B. Johnson may decide not to use it because of its association with the tragedy of Nov. 22.

After the assassination in Dallas, the specially built car was gone over by experts seeking to recover bullets, bullet fragments or other bits of evidence.

The car itself was not damaged in the shooting, aside from one possible exception. The experts did discover a small, unexplained hole in the windshield. Their initial study did not establish whether this was caused by a bullet fragment or by some other object.
