A fragment of this prime, according to the reports, passed out the front of the throat. This presumably would account for various reports suggesting —on the basis of the hurried observations of doctors in Dallas after the shooting there on Nov. 22—that there was wan "entry wound" in the front. of the throat

It was pointed out that during the short time the President was at Parkland Hospital "In Dallas he was on his back as efforts were made to revive him, and no examination was made of his back that would have revealed a wound there." The talk of a front "entry wound" had caused wide special lation about a second assassin's firing at Mr. Kennedy from in front of his car. The man who was accused of the killing, Lee H. Oswald, was said to have shot from a window above and behind the car.

The F.B.L., in its report to the special commission investirating the assassination, stated flatly that both bullets had for from the window where oswald assertedly was. But the report did not mention the success.

Pathologists performed the utopsy after Mr. Kennedy was brought to Bethesda Naval Hospital in Bethesda, Md., the night of the assassination. Their report is now in the hands of the Secret Service and will be included in a general report by the Treasury Department to the commission of inquiry. The Secret Service is part of the Treasury Department.

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
