

COMMISSION HEARS

MRS. OSWALD AIDE

(UPI)—A motel manager who has served as business adviser to Lee H. Oswald's widow said tonight he had no evidence that Oswald planned to shoot former Vice President Richard M. Nixon.

James Martin, who was quoted in The Houston Post as saying that Oswald planned to kill Mr. Nixon the day before the assassination of President Kennedy, Nov. 22, appeared before the commission that is investigating the assassination. It was an all-day session of testimony that extended until 10:30 P.M.

Allen W. Dulles, former director of the Central Intelligence Agency, said afterward that "your guess would be as good as mine" as to whether there was a plan to kill Mr. Nixon.

Mr. Martin told newsmen he had heard the Nixon story only yesterday from a source that he did not consider reliable. He said that he had no evidence of such a plot.

Mr. Martin's attorney, Paul W. Leech, said earlier, "We were misquoted this morning in The Houston Post."
