

Mrs. Kennedy to Tell Story of Assassination

WASHINGTON — Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy will give the Warren Commission her first-hand account of the assassination of her husband.

A spokesman for the commission said Friday that the wife of the late President has offered to co-operate in any way she can in the investigation.

Mrs. Kennedy was riding beside the President, in Dallas last Nov. 22 when he was fatally wounded.

The commission already has questioned the other four persons who were in the car with the Kennedys. They are Gov. and Mrs. John Connally of Texas and two Secret Service agents.

May Visit Dallas

The commission did not say how or where it plans to talk with Mrs. Kennedy. She may appear at the commission's headquarters or she may be interviewed at home.

Mrs. Marian Oswald, Russian-born widow of the accused assassin, Lee Harvey Oswald, is slated to return for questioning by the commission.

In her previous appearance, Mrs. Oswald said the evidence has convinced her that her husband was the President's assassin.

The commission also is reportedly interested in pursuing rumors that Oswald and his own killer, Jack Ruby, knew each other.

It is possible that members of the commission may travel to Dallas and other communities before ending their study, expected in late June.
