

LONE WALCONTENTS SLEW 3 PRESIDENTS

Washington, Sept. 27—That of the nation's four assassins that society had conspired against them.

This was the conclusion of the Warren Commission report released today.

The cast history of Lee Harvey Oswald, the assassin of President John F. Kennedy was discussed at length in the report. Brief accounts of other assassins and would-be assassins were also given.

Of the assassins, only John Wilkes Booth, who killed President Abraham Lincoln in 1865, was found to be part of a conspiracy.

Discussing the difficulty of screening out all potential assassins, the commission noted of four other assassins, it would be impossible to

know them as serious sources of prior violence. Each of them was a failure in his work and in his relations with others, a victim of obsessions and fanatics that led to the conviction had combined to thwart him.

"It will require every available resource of our government that has any reasonable possibility of revealing such calcontents."

Eighteen more agents were proposed for a rotating pool. These men would go through an intensive training cycle and also be available to assist the White House detail. The report also noted that the assassination of President Kennedy was the only one of the four assassinations that was not part of a conspiracy.
