Successor Plan Noted

Senator Wayne Morse, Democrat of Oregon, vociferous critic of the Administration's foreign policy, suggested to Professor Galbraith that United States policy on Vietnam would have been quite different had not President Kennedy died from an assassin's bullet.

The former President ordered an intensive review of Vietnam policies in the days just before his death, according to Senator Morse. He recalled having visited the President in the White House 10 days before his death on Nov. 22, 1963.

When the conversation turned to the situation in Vietnam, the President mentioned the Senator's critical speeches on the Senate floor and remarked that he "wasn't sure but what I was right," according to Senator Morse. President Kennedy said he had the Vietnam situation under "intensive study," he added.
