California native Dick Stark was only twenty years old when he placed a call from the Bertrand Russell home in Wales to Mark Lane in New York. Stark, now an advanced student in Marin College, San Francisco, put up the first \$6000 to commence preparation for the project. Stark eventually invested \$13,000 and talked his brother out of another \$13,000. A total of more than \$90,000 was to be spent in producing the film "Rush to Judgement."

The film is an important piece of work to be used for many years by those interested in unraveling the American mystery. The film is not being shown in this country, and there is little wonder when one considers that Jack Valenti, Lyndon's man, is running the American movie industry.
