Kennedy Autopsy Photos Barred to All Private

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2persons will not receive permission to see the autopsy phetographs and X-rays of President Kennedy's body for the next five years, a representative of the Kennedy family disclosed today.

A statement by Burke Mar-thall, a New York lawyer who has been designated by the Kennedy family to handle requests to see the items, indicated that news media representatives might be denied access to them for much longer. The 65 X-rays, color trans-

parencies and black and white negatives were placed in the National Archives by the Kengdy family on Monday.

Mr. Marshall's statement was

surprising in view of the an ernment spokesman that under the agreement with the Ken-nedy family only nonofficial persons approved by Mr. Mar-shall would be permitted to see the articles during the first five

years. This had created the impre sion that Mr. Marshall would give selected private persons access to the material. His latest statement appeared to rule this out

Mr. Marshall gave no reason for his decision.

No Approval Planned Reached in New York, where

he is general counsel for the Laternational Business Machines Corporation, Mr. Marshall said he would grant no requests from journalists, historians, bl-ographers and researchers for at least five years.

Under an agreement between the President's executors and the Government, only Federal investigative agents have the right during the first five years to see the material without Mr. Marshall's permission.

After the five-year period, se dected scholars and researchers will be grant been to the pictures and X-rays he said, but the news media will probably

till be excluded.
