COURT ASKED TO BAR OSWALD RECORDING

NEW YORK (UPI)—New York Supreme Court Justice Samuel Gold scheduled a hearing today on a request by the Information Council of Americans for an injunction barring a New York firm from reproducing a tape recording of an interview with Lee Harvey Oswald, assassin of President John F. Kennedy.

INCA, a nonprofit, anti-Communist educational organization based in New Orleans, said Audio Fidelity Records, Inc., of New York had planned today to start distributing a record album containing the recording.

The tape was made by William K. Stuckey, then a New Orleans newsmen, Aug. 17, 1963, about three months before Oswald killed Mr. Kennedy.

INCA Director Edward S. Butler III said his organization bought the tape from Stuckey Oct. 21, 1964.

Stuckey appeared before the Warren Commission which investigated the assassination and a transcript of the report was included in the commission's report.

Butler said Oswald in the interview described himself as a member of the pro-Castro Fair Play for Cuba Committee. He also criticized this country and the Soviet Union, where he lived about two-and-a-
