

VENIREMEN ADDED FOR TRIAL OF SHAW

NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 23—

The judge in the trial of Clay L. Shaw on charges of conspiracy in the assassination of President Kennedy arranged today for up to one thousand extra veniremen to be available for selection as jurors.

One juror was seated today, but the list of persons available for the remaining seven slots as jurors and two as alternates dropped below 50.

With his panel of 169 prospective jurors in danger of being exhausted, mostly because of "fixed opinions," Criminal District Judge Edward A. Haggerty Jr. ordered that the panels from other court sections in New Orleans be made available.

District Attorney Jim Garrison, meanwhile, subpoenaed six more witnesses.

They included Mrs. Mary Moorman of Dallas, who took several photographs at the scene of the assassination; Dr. Robert R. Shaw, a Dallas physician who attended Gov. John B. Connally Jr. of Texas, and James Altgens of Dallas, an Associated Press photographer who took an over-all view of the assassination scene at almost the exact moment when President Kennedy was hit.

Other witnesses subpoenaed were Meyer Goldberg of New York, who was alleged to have in his possession a photograph made by Mr. Altgens in Dallas, and two Dallas policemen, Bobby W. Hargis and Billy J. Martin.
