

# One Last Juror Sought for Panel in Shaw Trial

NEW ORLEANS—One last juror to serve on the panel that will try Clay L. Shaw on charges of conspiring to assassinate President John F. Kennedy was sought here Thursday.

Acting on orders of Criminal Court Judge Edward Haggerty Jr., deputy sheriffs began serving subpoenas on 150 New Orleanians, requiring them to appear in the courtroom this morning.

The judge ordered the names of the 150 especially drawn from the Orleans Parish (county) jury wheel after his own panel of prospective jurors, and those of the other seven criminal district judges here, had been exhausted in the nine-day effort to seat a 12-man jury for the Shaw trial.

More than 650 prospective jurors have been questioned since the selection process began Jan. 21.

Attorneys for Shaw used up the last of their 12 peremptory (without cause) challenges Thursday afternoon. The prosecution has one left.

When selection resumes today, an aide to Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison will

be making another bid in Washington to subpoena for use in the Shaw trial autopsy material on the late President now sealed in the National Archives.

Two weeks ago, a federal judge gave Garrison's office until today to show why the 45 photographs and 24 X rays are relevant to the Shaw case.

Garrison has claimed the material would prove the late President was slain in a crossfire, thus contradicting the Warren Commission Report which held Lee Harvey Oswald to be the lone assassin.

However, Judge Haggerty repeated Thursday an admonishment that he had made to both sides previously, "Mr. Garrison can criticize the Warren Report all he wants to. But we aren't going to try the Warren Report here."

The judge has pointed out that all the state has to prove is that Shaw conspired to slay the President and that either he or one of his coplotter carried out a single act in furtherance of that conspiracy, not that the plot culminated in Dallas on Nov. 22, 1963.
