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JUDSON EUGENE GHORMLEY

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The said witness, having been first duly sworn, testified as follows:

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DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. FENSTERWALD:

- Q. Will you state your full name, please?
- 8 A. Judson Eugene Ghormley.
 - Q. And how are you presently employed?
- 10 A. With the Shelby County Public Defender's Office.
- 11 Q. And how were you -- what was your position at the 12 time of Dr. King's murder?
 - A. I was a lieutenant with the Shelby County Sheriff's Department.
 - Q. Could you tell me where you were that day, where you were stationed?
 - A. Do you mean at the time of the death?
 - Q. I think it would save time if you would just tell us from a few minutes before the shot until a few minutes after the shot what your activities were?
 - A. Well, we had -- at the time they were having a garbage strike, and my TAC unit was assigned to patrol Main Street until the garbage strike was over.

This usually took two or three hours, and when it was over we went to the fire station at Butler and Main Street.

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- A lot of the men wanted to use the restroom and call home and such as this.
- Q. And where were you when the shot was fired?
- A. Inside the fire station in the restroom.
- Q. And could you tell us what you did immediately thereafter?
- A. Yes, sir. As soon as someone remarked that Dr. King had been shot we -- most of the fellows went out and turned and started going east alongside the fire station toward the motel.
- And, of course, I followed likewise, and when I got to the wall I looked across at the motel and the people were pointing toward the building on Main Street.
- And at this time I backtracked and went back to Main Street and up north on Main Street.
- Q. Did you eventually come to Mr. Canipes' amusement company?
- A. Yes.
- Q. Could you estimate the length of time between the firing of the shot and your arriving at Canipes?
- A. I don't know, but it was just a very few minutes.
- I wouldn't say over two or three minutes.
- Q. You ran to the street and to the back of the lot and then toward Mr. Canipes, is that correct?
- A. Yes.

- Q. Would you describe to us what you found when you arrived at that spot?
- A. Well, when I got to Mr. Canipes', if memory serves me, I believe there was a suitcase, and there was a blanket and also a rifle box. And one end of the rifle box had bulged up to where there was approximately six to eight inches of the barrel showing in the gun box of the rifle.
- Q. Was this package completely outside the door, or was it partially outside and partially inside?
- A. No, sir. As best I can remember it was completely outside the door.
- Q. And did you notice anyone running away from the scene at that time that you thought might have dropped it?

 Did that thought cross your mind?
- A. No, sir, I did not see a sole on Main Street.
- Q. If someone had been running south on Main Street they would have run into you?
- A. Yes, sir.
- 2. And you did not see anyone running north?
- A. No, I didn't see anyone at all.
- Q. Was there anybody else standing over the package when you discovered it?
- A. No, sir. Mr. Canipes, and I believe two black gentlemen inside his place of business, but there was no one standing near or around the box or the articles.

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Mr. Foreman?

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JAMES M. MCCRAW

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The said witness, having been first duly sworn, testified as follows:

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DIRECT EXAMINATION BY MR. FENSTERWALD:

- 7 Q. Mr. McCraw, would you state your full name for the record?
- 9 A. James M. McCraw.
- 10 Q. What is your present address, Mr. McCraw?
- 11 A. 2061 Carr.
- 12 Q. And your present occupation?
- 13 A. Yellow cabdriver.
- Q. Could you tell me whether back in 1968, April of
- 15 | 1968, at the time of Dr. King's murder, whether you were a
- 16 Yellow cabdriver at that time?
- 17 | A. I was.
- Q. Could you tell me whether you were acquainted with
- one Charles Stephens?
 - A. I was.

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- 21 Q. And how long had you known him?
- 22 A. About eight to ten years.
 - Q. And did you see him frequently?
- 24 A. Yes, I saw him pretty frequently.
 - Q. And did you carry him in your cab from time to time?

- 1 A. Yes, sir.
- 2 | Q. And did you, on occasion, take him to liquor stores?
- 3 A. Plenty of times.
- 4 | Q. Could you tell me whether on the afternoon of the
- 5 | murder you received a call to come to the rooming house to
- 6 pick up Charles Stephens?
- 7 A. Well, I didn't know who it was until I got up there.
- 8 Q. You had more than one customer there?
- 9 A. Yes. We had lots of calls to come there.
- 10 Q. When you got there you discovered it was to pick up
- 11 | Charles Stephens?
- 12 A. That's right.
- 13 | Q. Approximately what time was this?
- 14 A. About a quarter to six.
- 15 | Q. Was he waiting?
- 16 | A. I went upstairs to get whoever it was, and that's
- 17 when I found out who it was.
 - Q. What did you find?
- 19 A. I found him drunk.
- 20 Q. How drunk was he?
- A. He was lying on the bed. He couldn't get up. I would
- 22 say he was pretty drunk.
- 23 \ Q. He was not in walking condition?
- 24 A. He was not.
- Q. Do you think he could have gotten up and gotten to the door?

A. I doubt it very seriously.

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- Q. You went on about your business?
- A. I went back downstairs and told the dispatcher I
 wasn't aiming to haul him.
- 5 Q. At some point after Dr. King's murder did the FBI
 6 come and take your records of the cab company with respect
 7 to this day?
- 8 A. Somebody come and got it. I don't know who it was.
 9 I wasn't there.
- 10 Q. How did you become aware of this?
- 11 A. They told me at the cab company.
- 12 | Q. Had anybody from the defense requested those records?
- 13 A. Yes, I believe a lawyer did.
- 14 | Q. You don't recall who?
- 15 A. Yes, Foreman out of Texas.
- 16 Q. Do you know if he ever got the records?
- 17 A. No, I don't.
- MR. FENSTERWALD: No further questions.
- 19 MR. HAILE: No questions.
- 20 MR. FENSTERWALD: I have one further question.
- 21 THE COURT: All right.

22 BY MR. FENSTERWALD:

- 23 Q. Mr. McCraw, did Mr. Foreman, talk to you?
- 24 A. Yes, many times.
- 25 Q. Did Mr. Stanton speak with you?
