p. 1 He notes that the WC said much about Oswald's defection to the Soviet Union but nothing about the U-2 or O's work for the U-2 in Japan and the Philippines.

Helms told WC that Oswald had "no info regarding the U-2 or Its mission."

- p. 2 He notes that John Whitten wrote right after his assassination that the CIA received a no. of FBI and State Dept. re]ports in early November 1959 re: Oswald's threats to reveal all he knew about Navy radar installations in the Pacific.
- p. 2 He notes that Ann Egerter (Angleton's Office) showed intense interest in Oswald. Also notes that FBI Marvin Gheesling paid close attention to "defector" Oswald.

p. 5 He deals with FBI Gheesling at FBI HQers. . . he opened a "watch list" file on Oswald within a week of O's visit to the Embassy (means US Embassy) in late 1959 by creating a Flash card Oswald also added to HT Lingual list by Angelton which meant that all of his mail from USSR would be secretly opened.

He notes Gheesling took O off the watch list in October 1963 p. 5

p. 6 He says this removal of Oswald from the watch list meant that Dallas FBI would not be looking at him with close scrutiny when JFK came to town. (Says nothing about the Oswald Hosty note). . .
