ANSWERS

- 1. FALSE. The Bush administration's Nuclear Posture Review of 2001 asserts the right of the United States to use nuclear weapons first even against non-nuclear states—even though 81% of Americans said the U.S. should never use nuclear weapons first.
- 2. FALSE. Although the United States has observed a moratorium on nuclear testing since 1992, it has never ratified the CTBT. President Bush has said he will not ask the Senate to ratify the treaty—*even though 87% of Americans say we should participate in the CTBT.*
- **3. D.** None of the above. The United States continues to cling to a Cold War-era arsenal of 10,000 nuclear weapons—6,000 of them in its active arsenal with another 4,000 in lower states of readiness—*even though a majority of Americans think the U.S. needs no more than 100 nuclear weapons to deter other countries from attacking.*
- **4. D.** All of the above. The Bush administration has torn up or thrown into disarray years of work by negotiators working toward nuclear disarmament. This unilateralist approach has actually encouraged non-nuclear nations to pursue nuclear weapons development and has fueled a new arms race—*even though 84% of Americans said the U.S. should commit to seeking the ultimate elimination of nuclear weapons and make a greater effort toward that goal.*
