The FBI conclusions will go first to Attorney General Robert Kennedy, and then to President Johnson. Mr. Johnson is expected to forward the report as well as the Soviet file to a seven-man commission headed by Chief Justice Earl Warren. This group was named last week to "satisfy itself that the truth is known" about both shootings.

Apparently still unanswered are two highly relevant questions-where Oswald got the money to sinance a trip to Mexico City in late September and early October, and the whereabouts of a man identifying himself

as Bernard Weissman who

paid for a hate advertisement in a morning newspaper on the day Mr. Kennedy arrived in Dallas.

## IN DEBT

It has been learned that Oswald was in debt, and had not paid any rent on his \$8.aweek room in Dallas. investigators found \$150 in cash in the room after Oswald was arrested.

Authorities sald Oswald spent little, and seldom paid his bills. They said he also drew unemployment compensation during his long periods without work and saved much of that. However, still unanswered was how he could finance his many travels

Progress of the investigation has been delayed because it has been necessary to check on numerous false leads, it was learned.
