The charges which had been raised in the public press and  
in Congress regarding Mr. Norman Redlich were of concern to all the  
members of the Commission, which considered it of paramount importance  
that they be investigated thoroughly prior to any decision.

Mr. Redlich has informed the Commission that he is a member  
of the Emergency Civil Liberties Committee and that his interest in  
this organization has always been because of his great concern for  
civil liberties of all American citizens. In spite of the fact that  
the organization has been cited by the House Un-American Activities  
Committee and the Senate Subversive Activities Committee, it has not  
been cited by the Department of Justice and denies that it is or ever  
has been a Communist Front.

The investigation conducted by the Federal Bureau of  
Investigation relating to Professor Redlich was a very comprehensive  
one. The complete investigative file relating to Professor Redlich  
was reviewed by each member of the Commission. On the basis of such  
full consideration, the Commission on May 19, 1964, at a meeting  
attended by all the Commissioners, decided that Professor Redlich was  
entitled to have access to security materials and continue to serve  
as a consultant to the Commission.
