On page five, item eight, it is indicated that the Dallas Police Department in cooperation with the Secret Service and "other Government agencies" assisted in the security measures prior to the President's visit

This would imply that "other Government agencies" were responsible for physical security arrangements whereas this is the responsibility of the Secret Service.
