We have not included such broad areas of inquiry as Oswald's Mexican trip or Ruby's Cuban trip, etc. In all probability many of these items may have already been considered. However, some of them may be worthy of further study or action.

1. Jack Ruby maintained a safe-deposit box (No. 448 at the Merchants' State Bank in Dallas. In Commission #86, page 379 it states that Captain Will Fritz accompanied by Detective B. L. Shenkle and William F. Alexander, Assistant District Attorney, Dallas County, opened Ruby's safe-deposit It was empty. Virtually all banks require individuals opening safe-deposit boxes to sign a book or sheet. However, it is obvious that under certain circumstances this could be eircunvented. Therefore, in view of the box being empty, perhaps it would be desirable to make inquiries of bank personnel to determine if any access was had to the box by unknown persons in the interim period between Ruby's last recorded entry into the box and Captain Fritz' examination of the box?

No fingerprints were found on the three spent eidge casings found by the window. Would the firing of a tridge of this type in the rifle have the effect of removin prints from the cartridge casing?

Oswald was taken into custody by the Dallas polic 3. approximately 2:00 p.m. on November 22, 1953. He remained their eastedy until he was shot at approximately 11:25 on ember 24, 1963. Does the Commission have any direct testior information from the individuals who were guarding im regarding his comments, actions, etc., as distinguished rem official statements by Dallas police spokesmen, most of mich seem to be in the nature of a summary?
