

rest of the staff is not exculpated. It in fact is incriminated.

All the FBI and Secret Service records I cited reached the staff.

Beginning not only with the earliest news stories, which date to December, but also with the receipt of those first reports, that also date to December, the staff knew what the Commission was suppressing. It also knew that should not be suppressed, that it required the most diligent and vigorous investigation. It knew there was no such investigation. ^{limit} It knew there was suppression of what should not be suppressed. It knew that was wrong, very wrong.

And it was and it remained silent.

Not one complained. Not one said a word. Not one resigned in protest.

And not one has said a word or protested or complained since then.

This, too, redefines "honor."
