In accordance with the Director's instructions at 12:15 p.m. today, I immediately put in a call for the SAC in Dallas and talked to ASAC Clark. I advised him that Mr. Rankin had talked with the Director this morning and Rankin was very much interested in knowing who has been seeing Mrs. Marina Oswald and what she has been doing. The Director desires that a "stake out" be placed covering Mrs. Marina Oswald's present residence and that she be under very discreet surveillance when she leaves. He said persons contacting her and individuals she contacts should be identified. I told Clark this surveillance should be instituted immediately and if this presented impossible personnel problems, the Bureau should be advised and an effort would be made to get Dallas assistance.

The Director also instructed that consideration be given to putting technical coverage on the telephone available to Mrs. Marina Oswald. Clark was told to evaluate this immediately and call back later today and advise whether such is feasible. If so, we will expeditiously obtain the Attorney General's authority; that this technical surveillance should be put on as soon as possible.

The Director further said we should press Dallas to be sure the interview with Marina Oswald is conducted today concerning the Nixon matter. As a matter of fact, this interview is set for 1:30 p.m. today and Dallas is to furnish the highlights by telephone and the details by teletype. I told Dallas that the Director had indicated it seems a little incongruous that she had been able to lock her husband in a bathroom for all or part of a day when he was supposed to be a man of violent temper and one would think he would have broken down the door or have broken a window. During our interview with her, we should, therefore, determine what happened when he was locked in the bathroom and what did he do when he was released--did he beat her up or take any other violent action?

Mr. Hoover said we should also immediately interview Robert Oswald concerning the Nixon matter. In this connection, it should be noted that Robert Oswald has been interviewed concerning this matter and we have a signed statement from him.
