Dear Mr. Huff,

Anyone, man or woman with any concept of decency, even an immeasurably small portion of self-respect, would have responded, as the law requires, to my letter to you of 39 day ago with either an effort to disprove what I alleged in it or, if he or she also had the most minuscule portion of human decency, would have apologized for your outrageous letter of three days earlier.

Your letter in which you stated that you would reply as soon as possible.

Given the age of the appeals you ignored, the expiration of almost twice the time in which, under the law, you are to respond, and the attachments ^{which} for you ~~max~~ did not have to take the time to search, which more than complied with your request, without your giving your word and establishing once again that it worthless and you are not honest, you should have made some response long ago.

Has none of you any shame at all? Is there no limit to the abuse you can bring yourselves to visit upon an old man who suffers serious illnesses?

While the last thing I want to consider is further litigation, you involve both my own self-respect and my concept of a citizen's responsibilities and you force me to see if I can get counsel to handle this matter for me.

If I can, I will certainly ask for an exploration of whether there are sanctions for those who deliberately fail to performed their assigned duties. For which I pay my share of what you and your staff are paid.

Unless I hear from you promptly and responsivly, this is what ^I plan to do.
