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Reference is made to our conversation of January 23, 1964, concerning information furnished to the Commission by Mr. Wenry M. Wade, the District Atterney of Dallas County, Temps. You advised that Mr. Wede indicated he had been designed symbol Osweld had been an informant of the FM, had been assigned symbol Number "179," and had been paid \$200 mentaly in this capacity. You further advised that Mr. Wade also indicated that AM Headquarters was not in a position to know in all instances whether an individual was an informant of this Dureau.

For your information, Mr. Henry H. Wade was interviewed by Special Agent in Charge J. Cordon Shanklin and Assistant Special Agent in Charge Hyle G. Clark of our Dallas, Texas, Office on February C, 1964, in this matter.

Mr. Wade chained that during his discussion with the formission in Machington, D. C., on January 24, 1964, which he referred to as a very informal discussion with no notes taken to his knowledge, there were present Chief Justice Barl Warren and yearself. Wade stated that William Alexander, his assistant; wagginer Carr, District Attorney for the State of Texas; Robert Strey, farmer Dean of Southern Nothedist University; and Lean Jaworski, Houston attorney, accompanied him during his discussion with the Sammission.

According to Mr. Made, during his discussion with	
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the Commission on January 24, 1964, mention was made of voveher	
bumber 179 and the name Lee Marvey Cavald. In. Vade stated that	
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no such voucker was produced or emibited. In. Wade claimed	
that he told the Commission that the FBI Cia not have any	
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informent without a number and that an informant's identity was always known in FRI Healquarters. Mr. Wade added that he told the Commission that an individual Special Agent, in getting manay for an informant from FIX Headquarters, submitted the informant's number on a Voucher without a name. Hr. Wade also claimed he would the Commission that he had never heard of having an informant on the payrull by name.

Mr. Wade further stated that during his discussion with the Commission he thinks he was asked about retaining receipts from informable but he could not recall whether he had to obtain such receipts when he was handling informants on Special Intelligence Service assignment as an FDI Agent. Kr. Wade claimed he tried to convey to the Commission that an informant could not be developed by an FDI Agent without knowledge of FDI Headquarters.

Auring our interview with Mr. Wade, he reviewed the expense accounts submitted by him while he was on Special Intellisance Survice assignment and he stated that all funds expended by him were entirely and accurately accounted for and that he new realises he did not receipts and that the empenditures by him were reported to EN licedquarters in detail. In. Wade also stated he did not handle any informants without the full knowledge of NEW Headquarters.

In. Wade volunteered that he would be talking to you within the next few days and he was going to clarify the fact that he did obtain receipts from informants.

with the Consission on Jamery 24, 1964, he recalls there was a limited conversation about the possibility that Los Harvey Cowald might have been an FBI informant and that there was here speculation that Oswald might have been an informant of the Central Intelligence Agency. He recalled that Mr. Nahunt Storey stated he was with the United Commission in Cornery after world war II and either worked for or with the Central Intelligence Agency in Europe. In. Vade added that Mr. Storey indicated that the Central Intelligence Agency had informants that no one knew about except the Central Intelligence Agency Agent and that the informant might have an informant.

In conclusion, in. Mode reiterated that he told the commission that he had no information to the effect that Lee Harvey Guard was an informant of the FBI or any Governmental elency.

NOTE: On 1-28 Mr. Rankin of the Commission met with the Director. At that time Mr. Rankin informed that Mr. Wade in appearing before the Commission stated that Lee Harvey Oswid bore the designation of "17" as an informant of the FBI and was paid \$200 per month. Rankin also informed the Director of other comments made by made re the latter's assignment with the SIS during 1942 and 1943 wherein Wade alleged there was no record of how FBI funds were spent nor for what purposes they were used by employees of SIS.
