Dear lir. Byington:

Congressman Roggs has forwarded to me your letter of May 9 relating to Horman Redlich, a consultant to the President's Commission on the Assassination of President Kennedy.

Security requirements for federal employees are governed by President Eisenhover's Executive Order No. 16450, which provides that "The appointment of each civilian officer or employee in any department or egency of the Government shall be made authored to investigation." Such an investigation was made in the case of Mr. Redlich by the Civil Service Commission and the Federal Dureau of Investigation, and the facts developed were evaluated by the nambers of the Commission—Earl Marron, Chairman, Chief Justice of the United States, Richard B. Ruscoll, John Eherman Cooper, Nale Boggs, and Garald R. Ford, leading Desocratic and Republican members of the United States Congress, John J. McCloy, former High Commissioner of Germany, and Allen W. Dulles, former head of the United States Central Intelligence Agency.

On May 19, 1964, at a meeting attended by all the Commissioners, the Commission unanimously cleared all the members of its staff to handle classified information. The members of the staff who were cleared included Mr. Redlich.
