Dear Senator Keating:

With the many thousands of loyal, dedicated, patriotic American lawyers who are ready and willing to serve their country, why was a man appointed to serve the Warren Commission whose background and past contacts definitely show that he has strong Communist contacts? How can the American public be asked to believe the ultimate findings of the Warren Commission when a pro-Communist was instrumental in the investigation?

The commentator Fulton Lewis Jr. has also stated in two radio broadcasts recently that Norman Redlich had connections of some sort with the Fair Play for Cuba Committee of which Lee Oswald was associated.

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
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This man's appointment, in my estimation, is a travesty of justice that must be exposed so that all of the facts are brought out.
