I epologies for the delay in responding to your letter of July 21, 1964, eddressed to the Chief Justice.

The verious scabers of the Cormission staff were chosen by the Cormission upon my recommendation. The selection was based primarily on academic and professional qualifications, although an effort was also made to select members from different prographical sections of the United States. Professor Sadlich was one of the staff members hired in this fashion.

An you know, security requirements for federal employees are governed by President Alsenhour's Executive Order No. 10:50, which provides that The appointment of each civilian officer or employee in any department or agency of the Government shall be made subject to investigation." Such an investigation was made in the case of Mr. Fadlich by the Civil Service Cormission and the Federal Eurem of Investigation, and the facts developed were evaluated by the members of the Cormission—Earl Warren, Chairman, Chief Justice of the United States; Elchard D. Russell, John Sharman Cooper, Hale Mogge, and Gerald R. Ford, leading Democratic and Republican members of the United States Congress; John J. NeCloy, former High Cormissioner of Germany; and Allen W. Dolles, former head of the United States Control Intelligence Agency.

On Fact 19, 1964, at a meeting attended by all the Commissioners, the Commission unanimously cleared all the numbers of its staff to heallo classified information. The members of the staff who were cleared included hr. Redlich.

I hope that this information will essist you in responding to the inquiries which you have received.
