Dear Congressman Hanna:

In response to your request of October 21, 1964, for information to aid you in answering Mr. Stephen R. Jones' inquiry concerning Mr. Norman Redlich, who was employed as a consultant to the President's Commission on the Assassination, the following may be helpful to you.

Security requirements for federal employees are governed by President Eisenhower's Executive Order No. 10450, which provides that "The appointment of each civilian officer or employee in any department or agency of the Government shall be made subject to investigation." Such an investigation was made in the case of Mr. Redlich by the Civil Service Commission and the Federal Bureau of Investigation, and the facts developed were evaluated by the members of the Commission.

As you probably know, on May 19, 1964, at a meeting of the full Commission, the Commission unanimously granted clearance to Mr. Redlich and issued the following public statement:

"The Commission met today to discuss the taking of further testimony and looking toward the formulation of a report. It also reviewed all of the field investigations concerning the security clearance of its employees, and the Commission unanimously cleared all of the members of the staff to handle classified information."

You may wish to inform Mr. Jones regarding the Commissioners and their official capacities. In answering correspondence addressed

to this office, we inform them as follows: Earl Warren, Chairman, Chief Justice of the United States; Richard B. Russell, John Sherman Cooper, Hale Boggs, and Gerald R. Ford, leading Democratic and Republican members of the United States Congress; John J. McCloy, former High Commissioner of Germany; and Allen W. Dulles, former head of the United States Central Intelligence Agency.
